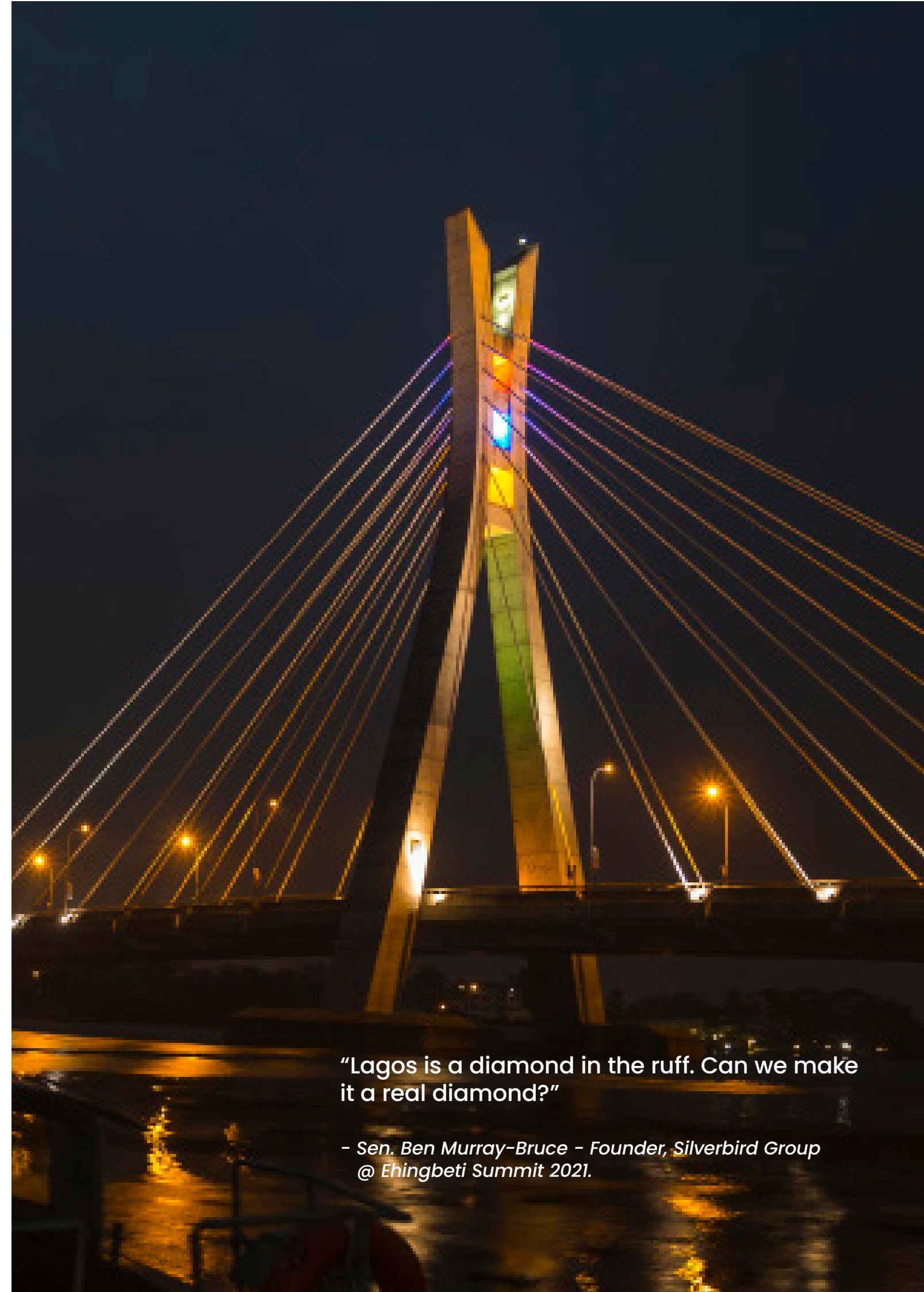

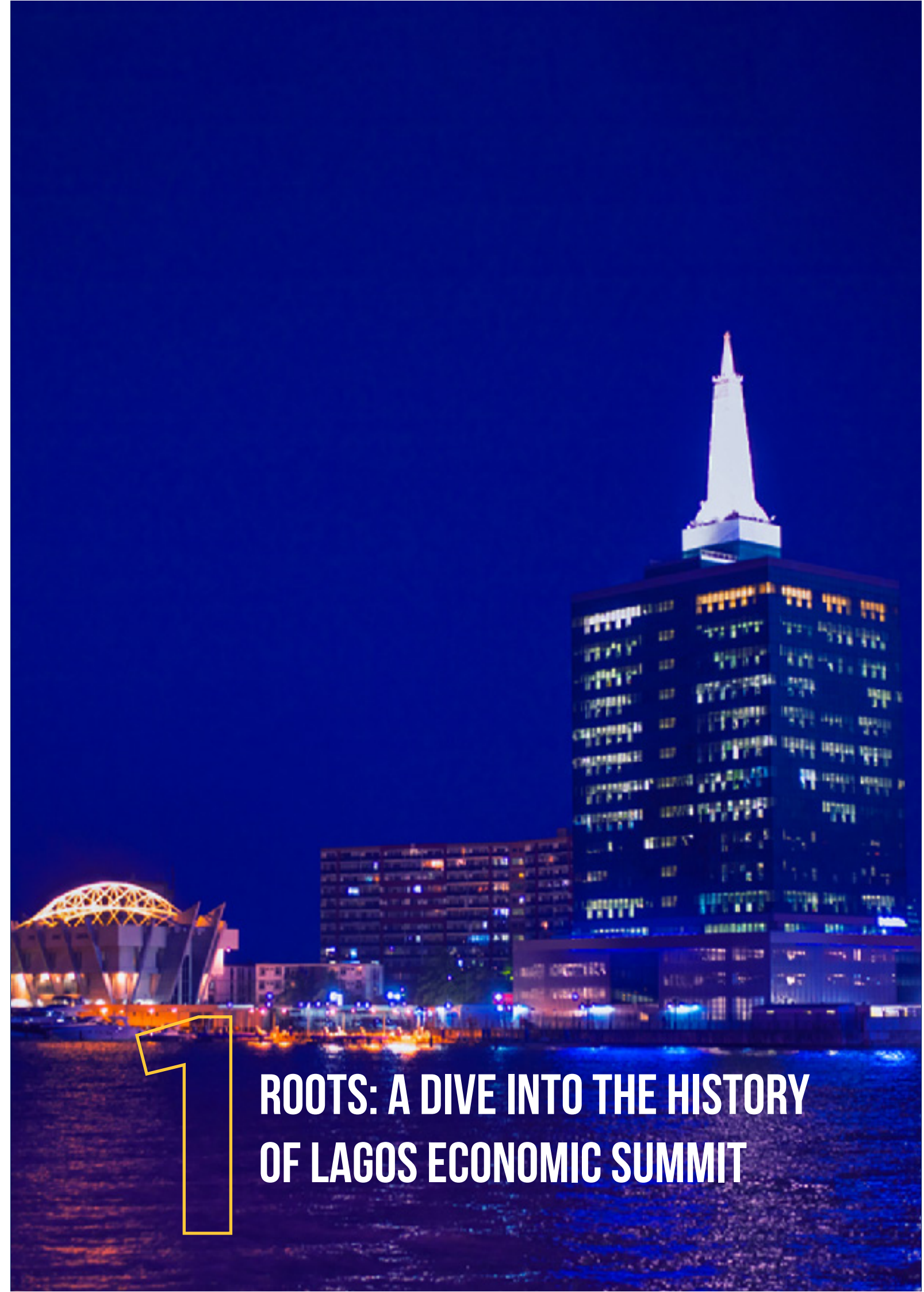

OF LAGOS ECONOMIC SUMMIT**



Ehingbeti: A Symbol for Socio-Economic Heritage

Ehingbeti represents the economic heritage of the Marina and Broad Street areas of Lagos State, which served as the springboard for Nigeria and West Africa socio-economic development right from the time of European incursion in 1472 and the establishment of the African Association in Lagos in 1884.

The Association embraced pioneer African merchant princes and European supercargoes who promoted the establishment of Lagos civilizing role and the enterprising Lagos Chamber of Commerce and Industry, the doyen of West African business chambers. Indeed, Ehingbeti symbolises a glorious past and a future building block for Lagos and ECOWAS economic growth based on greater Private Sector Participation (PSP). Geographically, it is the waterway and adjoining lands stretching from the Marina West (Alakoro/Apongbon) to Iru Creek in Marina East (Onikan), with access to Porto Novo and beyond in the west, and the Lekki corridor in Lagos East.

The area was the choice site of commercial piers, multinational conglomerates, old Lagos Custom Quay and European settlement.

The virility and development of Lagos State is inextricably bound with Ehingbeti (Marina/Broad Street) as reflected in the common saying "B'uju o ba t'Ehingbeti oju ole t'Eko". This means so long as the maze of waterways is available for haulage of men, ideas and goods, so will Lagos continue to prosper as the emporium of Nigeria's economic and financial activities.

Ehingbeti today is now known as the Lagos Economic Summit.

GROWTH AND DEVELOPMENT OF EHINGBETI

The Ehingbeti Summit has over the years served as a beacon of change and helped shape the future of Lagos State through public discourse.

In 2000, the first edition ensured a gathering of policymakers and private sector leaders to discuss accelerating economic growth through private sector partnership in infrastructural development.

Conversations in the next two editions – 2001 and 2002 – moved around improving urban development, economic growth and social responsibility through effective partnership in the city-state and building Lagos Megacity and the Challenges of Economic Development.

Six years later, precisely 2008, the conversation transited to Transforming Lagos into Africa's Model megacity. In 2010, stakeholders converged to examine and develop strategies for Investment opportunities in Africa's emerging model megacity – Lagos.

The 2012 edition came with a global appeal, FROM BRICS TO BRINCS: Lagos Holds The Key. Powering the Lagos Economy took the centre stage in 2014.

This year, the focus is on a progressive, futuristic outlook - For a Greater Lagos: Setting the Tone for the Next Decade.

SOCIAL AND ECONOMIC IMPACT OF THE SUMMIT

Since debuting in 2000 at the Lagos Tourist Resort, Akodo, there have been seven editions of the summit, with the following themes and achievements;

Mr. Governor, Mr. Deputy Governor, I'd like to crave your indulgence to stand on existing protocol, for time. My job is simple today. It's basically to take us through the journey of Ehingbeti and the past performance of The Ehingbeti Summit over time.

Ehingbeti represents the economic heritage of the Marina and Broad Street areas of Lagos State. It served as the springboard for Nigeria and West Africa's economic development since European incursion in 1472. The strength and the development of Lagos is inextricably tied and bound to Ehingbeti. Since the first Ehingbeti which took place in 2000 at The Eko Tourist Beach Resort Centre, Akodo at Ibeju-Lekki, there has been seven (7) other summits since that time, and as the Yoruba saying goes, "B'oku o ba ti Ehingbeti, oju o le ti Eko." And for those of you who do not understand Yoruba like myself, what it literally means is that if Ehingbeti is not shamed, then Lagos cannot be disgraced. As long as the waters continue to flow by our Marinas, Lagos will continue to thrive. So long as the maze of waterways are available for the haulage of men, ideas, goods, so long will Lagos continue to prosper as the emporium of Nigeria's economic activity.

Ehingbeti has stayed as a beacon of change and has helped shape Lagos State's public discourse over time, and this is the 20th anniversary of Ehingbeti, whether it is from 2000 where the theme was accelerating economic growth through private sector partnerships in infrastructural development, or in 2008 where it is transforming Lagos into Africa's Model Megacity which really set the tone for our vision to become Africa's model city, an economic and financial hub that is safe, secure, functional, and productive, or in 2014 where it was powering the Lagos economy, or even now, for a greater Lagos; setting the tone for the next decade, and you'll see that through all of these years, it has been about partnership, about working together. So, when we say, "Igbega ipinle, ajumose ni," what we are saying is sounding again and again the message that has come from past Ehingbetis to shape our future as we go.

I'll take us through the highlights of past summits from 2000 Ehingbeti when the theme was; Accelerating economic growth through private sector partnerships in infrastructural development. Some of the highlights of what came out of that had to do with ensuring due process, transparency, and accountability in governance, which is why we are not surprised when The World Bank comes and talks about state fiscal sustainability and transparency in governance, Lagos State always hits the right scores and moves ahead, because Ehingbeti has put that as part of our culture all the time from the very beginning. It also brought out the idea that we must have secured commitment from the state legislature and judiciary to establish legal and regulatory frameworks to promote private sector participation and engagement, and Lagos has continued to be leading light as far as frameworks and executive orders are concerned that shape the way we interact with the private sector and the way the private sector interacts with us.

In 2001, it was improving urban development, economic growth and social responsibility through effective partnerships and out of that came the establishment of the Lagos Security Trust Fund which we now have today as a major partner in our security infrastructure. It also helps to promote the idea of the establishment of Export Free Zones and SME industrial parks. So, when you see the Lekki Free Zone and you see the Deep Seaport come out of it and you see Dangote Refinery, they all have their roots in Ehingbeti. It is out of the same Ehingbeti that we talked about the establishment of the urban transportation office which has migrated and morphed into LAMATA from where you now begin to see The Blue Line, The Red rail line,

The Green Line, The Purple Line, and The Orange Line being advertised. Indeed, Ehingbeti has played very significant roles in the development of Lagos.

In 2002, it was Lagos Megacity and the challenges of economic development, and as you see pictorial representations of what we envisaged Lagos to look like. Again, it was about encouraging participation and working together, and it was out of this summit that we talked about establishing The Disaster Management Agency and LASAM bus was born for risk mitigation. So, when you see our emergency first respondents reach a particular place with ease, with speed and efficiency and there are no complaints about water or about capacity, all of these have their roots in past Ehingbetis.

In 2008, it was about transforming Lagos into Africa's model city, the foundation of our vision which I just read earlier, and it set the tone that we no longer compare ourselves with cities in Nigeria, but compare ourselves with other cities around the world. It's clear in our mind the kind of city that we want to build and the challenges that come with trying to do that. This is why Ehingbeti continues to roll because we know that we cannot do these without partnerships.

2010 was investment opportunities in Africa's emerging model city and 2012 was when we insisted that we'd not allow it to be BRICS alone but we must introduce Nigeria into the mix for BRINCS. It was clear to us that Lagos must play a pivotal role in this and that partnership was going to play a lot of role in making that happen because Lagos was the gateway of the world into Nigeria controlling over 75% of the traffic in and out of Nigeria, and it was also the gateway of Nigeria to the world.

2014 was about powering the Lagos economy and we became a leading light in the thoughts around instituting an energy academy. We became leading lights when it came to driving an intermodal system and because this thing comes under review every year, we are now talking of a multi-modal transportation system.

So, what are the notable successes that have followed since then? I talked about the Lagos Blue Line and the Red Line rail, a very monumental project and significant in many senses. Not any sub-national undertakes projects like these at the same time. In another two years, we believe that these two rail lines will begin to move and reduce the travel time by almost 250% for people coming from Agbado all the way to Oyingbo, or from along the Expressway from Badagry all the way to Marina. The idea of the 4th Mainland Bridge also has its roots in Ehingbeti and the fact that we could combine to ensure that we drive transportation infrastructure through private partnerships and the Deep Sea Ports were all part of this.

In the education sector, we knew that at some point, we'd need to leverage technology and the Lagos Eko Excel Project that was going to drive 450,000 study materials and equipment with our children at school was going to be launched and this is currently operating. The Lagos Energy Academy as I said and the Agriculture-based Empowerment Scheme were all products of Ehingbeti.

Not to talk about the housing programmes and the Rent-to-Own programmes and the low interest cost for funding mortgages all had its roots in Ehingbeti, but Ehingbeti was not just about government action. It was also about the partnership between government and private sector. So, when we speak out of Ehingbeti, the government responds, the private sector responds.

So, that is why our own Sahara energy takes out and takes over Egbin in KEPCO to ensure that the entire plan remains intact. That is why the government goes ahead to control the value chain around rice, and begins to do the Imota Rice Mill. These are the stories of Ehingbeti.

That is why we get the private sector to go ahead and do Alero City or Dangote to do the refinery. This is what Ehingbeti is about. It's about that partnership. It's about acting together. It's about us acting individually, but towards the same objective of a greater Lagos. In this summit, we want to say to ourselves; Let's set the tone for the next decade. It's going to flag up the 30-year development plan for 2050. This is a partnership dialogue to assess the collective intelligence of the people of Lagos, because we believe that intelligence does not reside in one place. It is a combination of everybody, and the human resource and human capacity of Lagos must be put into play. Unlike other conferences, the resolution reached in all of these conferences over the years in which it has run has been phenomenal and has been part of all our plans going forward. We've had over 203 resolutions in part Ehingbetis. We've implemented 95% of them and that is the spirit of Ehingbeti.

Mr. Governor, Mr. Deputy Governor, distinguished guests present here, I'd like to say to you that the future starts now and that is why we can actually say, "Igbega Eko ti di ajumose." Thank you very much.

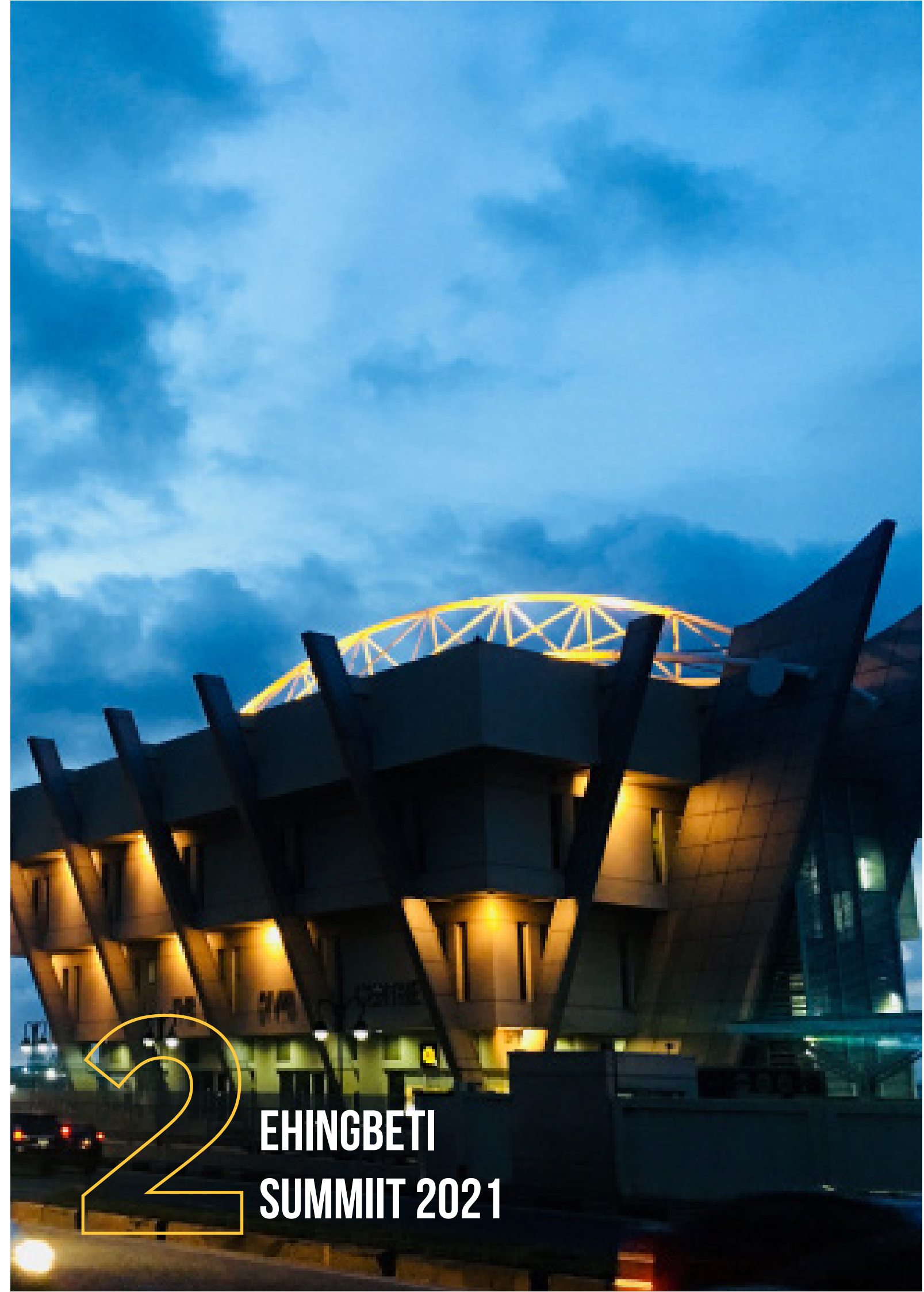

WELCOME SPEECH

The Governor, Lagos State, Honourable Members of the Cabinet and House of Assembly, members of the press, distinguished ladies and gentlemen, all protocols observed. It is with great pleasure that I welcome you to the 2021 edition of the Lagos Economic Forum, popularly known as the Ehingbeti Summit.

This great journey began in May 2000, when EHINGBETI broke new ground by becoming the first economic summit held by a sub-national unit in Nigeria. It was the brainchild of Bola Ahmed Tinubu and the child of circumstance and necessity, initiated while the first Bola Ahmed Tinubu administration was barely one year in office and had inherited a Lagos that was glaringly creaking and coming apart at the seams. It was clear that a new paradigm for development was needed and the administration set about its task with gusto.

Several work groups comprising some of the best and brightest from various walks of life were assembled and charged with fashioning policy thrusts for the different sectors of the economy. One of the recommendations that emanated from this was the setting up of a Ministry of Economic Planning and Budget.

I was honoured and privileged to be called upon to set up the ministry and to be its first Commissioner. I am humbled as I recall the passion and contributions of my staff and I in advocating for Ehingbeti; and, eventually bringing it into being as a platform for enhanced collaboration with stakeholders, especially from the private sector. The most eloquent recognition afforded our efforts is the fact that so many other states in the federation emulated our example by setting up similar ministries, and in many cases, initiating economic development summits.

I would also like to note that Ehingbeti contributed in no small measure to the trend of private sector experts deciding that serving in government need not be anathema. From that period onwards, there have been more and more eminently capable private hands joined in the task of state and nation building. It is a trend I heartily commend.

We have held this summit successfully for over two decades – indeed, this marks the 21st year since the Ehingbeti Summit commenced... certainly the longest by any sub-national in the

country. The end result has so far been seven (7) well-received Ehingbeti Summits, 206 resolutions of which 193 have been successfully implemented, a strong culture of public-private sector collaboration in Lagos State and many, many great achievements.

The foregoing explains why, despite the challenges we have had with the Covid-19 pandemic and its disruptive effect on businesses, we have been resolute in our decision that the Summit must happen. In response, we have harnessed all our creativity to be able to hold this hybrid summit both virtually and with some live sessions, so we can continue to deliberate on issues that would move Lagos State forward. The theme for this year's summit is "For a Greater Lagos: Setting the tone for the next decade". This theme very much resonates with what the current thinking is for both Lagos and Nigeria.

Lagos has witnessed appreciable development over the past 10 years. In 2010, Lagos had a GDP of N12.091 trillion; 10 years later, the economy of Lagos has grown to at least 5 times that. This growth in GDP has been accompanied

by significant infrastructure development including the Lekki-Ikoyi Link Bridge, Eko Atlantic and many others. Other sectors such as housing and financial services have also seen significant growth. The growth has come with some employment opportunities and the financial sector has grown to meet the increasing needs of the Lagos population. The needs of the people are varied and it is important that we not only create employment for them but also find creative ways to empower them economically.



Lagos is a megacity and must begin to look and operate like a megacity. That will only be possible if we deliberate about the plans and policies we put in place to ensure that both the public and private sector can achieve the set goals and objectives meant to develop the city. I believe we have the leaders with the know-how and we have the workforce. What we need to do is provide the vision and guidance to make sure it happens. That is what this summit is about. Bringing together the people that can give not just great insights but also help us put together a road map for success, to ensure that this great city reaches its goal of being Africa's pre-eminent city and one of the best cities in the world.

That is not to say, it's going to be easy. Neither is it to pretend that there will not be challenges along the way. What we affirm is that whatever the challenges we face, giving up is not an option. We must keep on pushing till Lagos reaches its deserved status in the world. The importance of Lagos doing well to the economy of Nigeria is quite clear to everyone. It is estimated that Lagos contributes about 30% to Nigeria's GDP. What that means is if Lagos does well, Nigeria will do well. The success of Lagos is therefore not just a Lagos issue but a national issue. As a country, we must do whatever is possible to ensure that Lagos realises its inestimable potential and drives economic growth in Nigeria.

There are several opportunities we can harness in Lagos. We have a very youthful population, and this serves as a good opportunity to drive entrepreneurship and growth of small-scale industries. There are examples like Silicon Valley in San Francisco which has not only contributed to California but also the United States of America, and ultimately the whole world in terms of driving new enterprise, especially in the area of technology. How do we develop a model like that? I believe the discussions during this summit will give us a clearer understanding of what needs to be done.

With our youthful population also comes the need for education. Investment in the infrastructure required to ensure that our children are not only well educated, but that they also have access to all the associated opportunities within the educational sector. When I say well educated, what I mean is bridging the gap between the high-end schools and the lower-end schools, to ensure that there is a minimum standard set across Lagos state. This is something we can do and it requires that we start thinking about

to ensure that happens. I believe that as we explore the various topics during the summit, more insights will come on this.

The youthful population in Lagos also means that there will be a constant demand for affordable housing. Investment in low-cost but quality housing units is an area we seriously need to look into. The investors in the real estate business need to work with the state on strategies and plans that can ensure that the cost of housing is brought down to the level that makes it affordable to the people of Lagos. It may require new technology and ways of building but we cannot overlook it if we really mean to solve the housing challenge in Lagos. We have the experts with us for the next 3 days to break down the issues and help us clear a path that will lead us to success.

I hope this has given you an idea of why we are here today, and over the next couple of days. Permit me to be unequivocal, we are here to discuss and find solutions that will make Lagos the best investment destination in the world. We want to put Lagos State back on the map as the Headquarters for businesses in West Africa and Africa. We plan for this summit to be highly interactive with plenary sessions and discussion forums that allow the public to contribute their opinions to the discussions.

Key areas we will touch on during this summit include how to make Lagos the world's best investment destination, how to strengthen governance institutions and legislation, driving a digital economy in Lagos, how to develop the human capital in Lagos, how to fund the resultant growth in a sustainable way and how to ensure Lagos remains resilient and achieves the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

Let me welcome you once again and request that we all participate keenly to ensure that we have a successful summit, but most importantly, that we end the summit with insights and opportunities that would change the outlook of Lagos going forward. I wish all a successful summit.

God bless Lagos State, God bless the Federal Republic of Nigeria and God bless you all.

WELCOME ADDRESS

Gov. Babajide Sanwo-Olu, Lagos State Governor

Your Excellency, Muhammadu Buhari, President and Commander-in-Chief of the Federal Republic of Nigeria, Representatives of Presidents and Heads of States, Asiwaju Bola Ahmed Tinubu, National Leader, All Progressives Congress, Oba of Lagos, Oba Rilwan Akiolu, Member of the Diplomatic Community Chief Executives and Captains of Industry, Distinguished Speakers, Guests, Youths, Ladies and Gentlemen.

It is a great pleasure to welcome you all to the 8th edition of Lagos Economic Summit (Ehingbeti). Our focus this year is "For a Greater Lagos: Setting the tone for the next decade." The Summit was originally planned to take place in November 2020, but the fallout of the #ENDSARS protests caused it to be rescheduled, until now.

This also happens to be the first edition of the Summit happening against the backdrop of the Coronavirus pandemic. Here is a pandemic that has disrupted life in every country in the world, and ushered in truly unprecedented times, where physical contact with family and friends could be a source of debilitating illness, and where our places of worship and community interactions have been upended.

Even before the pandemic, the 21st century was rapidly and dramatically changing the way we work and live, and amid all the ensuing volatility, complexities and ambiguities, we have been seeing a widening disparity between the haves and the have nots. Now the pandemic has come to accelerate the disruption.

Our growing youth population are disillusioned, their future and prospects for jobs are in question. We must all be distressed by this state of affairs, living as people with no hope or inspiration should never be an option for our young people. Distinguished guests, ladies and gentlemen, in the midst of every adversity lies an abundance of opportunities; it all depends on how we choose to view things. We are





emerging from the most significant act of economic destruction that Lagos has witnessed in decades, combined with the effects of being the national epicenter of a stubborn pandemic. Yet Lagos has always been a beacon of hope in Nigeria, the sheer tenacity and audacity of the Lagosian spirit has over the centuries created vast opportunities for entrepreneurship and innovation. The challenge for us is to ensure we never forget our indomitable spirit to emerge out of adversity better and stronger. We must continue to maintain and nurture our audacious hope, and the intention to always bounce back from adversity and build back better and boldly.

The theme for this year looks out over the next decade, the 2020s. But to properly understand the Lagos of the future, we must look back at the past, and trace the journey we have made to where we are today.

Today's Lagos has seen so many revolutionary changes to usher in a new era of prosperity; reflected in improved infrastructure, economy, and security. We are still confronted with many challenges, no doubt, but it is also important to identify the progress so we can guard it jealously and build on it.

Let me seize this opportunity to quickly remind us of what makes Lagos tick; the very essence of that greatness we are gathered to discuss at

this conference:

- We are the largest city in Nigeria and the 7th fastest growing city in the world, and the gold factor that sets us above the rest is of course our human capital: their entrepreneurial energy, optimism and ability to pull together.
- Our citizens' unwavering confidence in our leadership comes with the charge to develop and implement long-range Development plans for transformational change in the State. This is indeed demonstrated by the relatively very high standard of political stability in the state.
- The fact that we have continued to invest in, and improve on our legal and regulatory mechanisms, including alternative dispute resolution options together with improved judicial infrastructure. We regularly issue new laws and executive orders to strengthen the frameworks that underpin the ease of doing business.
- Our demographic and geographical endowments: over 22 million people, Sea Ports that control over 75% of Nigerian imports, a 180km coastline and the busiest airport in West Africa, Lagos is one huge and accessible market within the West African Economic zone, and well positioned for the African Continental Free Trade Area agreement. Need I remind us that, were Lagos a country, it would be West

Africa's second largest economy, after Nigeria?

- The fact that the last two decades of unbroken democracy have seen much evidence of material progress in Lagos. In terms of Transportation infrastructure, we have the construction of the Lekki-Epe Expressway, Lekki/Ikoyi Link Bridge, Pen Cinema Bridge, Agric Isawo Road, The International Airport Road; and very recently, the flag off of the Regional and Ibeju Lekki-Epe Roads, together with over 10,000Km of road networks, ramps and junction improvements. We have seen the regeneration of several parts of the Metropolis, with one of the more high-profile ones being the Lagos Island Central Business District.
- Over the last two decades, we have seen the construction of five (5) Independent power plants in Akute, Island, Alausa, Lekki Peninsula and Lagos Mainland. We are national trailblazers in this regard and are determined to explore efficient alternative sources in meeting the energy needs of Lagosians.
- We have also built over 5,000 units of houses and delivered them under the home ownership scheme.

Distinguished guests, ladies and gentlemen, I now invite you to join me to look ahead at the next decade, and the possibilities that lie ahead for Lagos State. In other words, what

will Lagos State look like by 2030? There will be a city-wide network of colour-coded Metro Lines, the first two of which – Red and Blue – will move over 34.5million people monthly, cutting travel time by over 250%. In 2030 Lagos will proudly stand beside every other Megacity in the world, in terms of its capacity to transport its people efficiently and responsively. Our water transportation systems will by 2030 be a central element of life in the Megacity, and no longer a marginal asset. The Fourth Mainland Bridge will come to define the cityscape of the 2020s in the same way the Lekki-Ikoyi Link Bridge defined it a decade earlier.

Going beyond just having the transportation infrastructure systems that a megacity of this status deserves, we will ensure that all of these systems are interconnected and truly multi-modal in nature; that the roads, waterways and rail are integrated and operating in synergy to bring maximum benefit and comfort to the reatest number of commuters. In 2030, Lagos will be a Smart City, fully covered by a network of several thousands of kilometers of fibre optic infrastructure that will carry broadband internet into our homes, offices and schools and unleash a technology revolution that has never before been seen in this part of the world. The Smart City that is unfolding will also be home to a network of intelligent cameras that will support not only security and policing across the State, but also



traffic management and data collection for urban planning.

As you all know, land is not a resource we are generously endowed with in Lagos – we are the smallest State in Nigeria by land mass, with by far the largest population. Yet this should not be an excuse for us to shy away from exploiting the agriculture value chain to the fullest, with a focus on non-land-intensive aspects like processing and value addition. By 2030, Lagos will be home to one of the largest Rice Mills in the world, in Imota. We can still aspire, even with our geographical limitations, to feed ourselves and the rest of the country, through the innovative use of technology and a focus on processing and industry.

In terms of private sector development, we have the Lekki Free Zone rising on the eastern flank of the city, with the mixed-use Alaro City as a flagship investment. Nearby are the Dangote Refinery, which will be the largest single-train Refinery in the world, and a Petrochemical Plant, as well as the Lekki Deep Sea Port, which will be Nigeria's biggest and most important Deep Sea Port.

On the western flank of the City, the ongoing road construction along the Lagos-Badagry Expressway will open up new opportunities for investment in residential, commercial and industrial real estate, similar to what we have seen in the Lekki Corridor over the last two decades. The opportunities for tourism are going to be immense as well, and there is no doubt that Lagos can and will turn Nigeria into an African tourist magnet.

Cultural tourism is far from being the only possibility that beckons. We see the potential for becoming a hub of medical tourism as well, with the increasing wave of investment in healthcare infrastructure that we are seeing in the State.

If we keep up the pace, by 2030 there will be a steady influx of people from West Africa and beyond coming to Lagos to take advantage of state-of-the-art hospitals. We are pushing ahead with plans to develop, in partnership with the private sector, a Medical Park that will offer world-class medical and diagnostic services in Ikoyi.

We have so much to celebrate, but there is also so much to be done, and we are driven by a sense of urgency on the enormous task ahead to build the Lagos of our dreams. The remarks from Dr. Yemi Cardoso, Co-Chair of the Lagos Economic Summit Group (LESG), and the 'Ehingbeti 2021' Steering Committee, have touched very eloquently on the many opportunities Lagos presents for harnessing: in technology and innovation, infrastructure, youth empowerment, and in attracting investment from around the world and positioning ourselves as the economic center of West Africa and even Africa.

Our Administration's agenda – T.H.E.M.E.S – represents six strategic pillars of development focused on Traffic Management and Transportation, Health and Environment, Education and Technology, Making Lagos a 21st Century Economy, Entertainment and Tourism as well as Security and Governance to help harness the full potential of Lagos and shape the State into a competitive megacity in this new decade.

The Ehingbeti Summit has been a long-standing platform for driving conversations and generating insight about developmental policies and projects that drive growth and prosperity for Lagosians. I am enthusiastic about this Summit's outcomes and how these initiatives can be implemented to make Lagos State transform from a Megacity to a Smart city during the course of this new decade.

I look forward to the goodwill messages, keynote speeches and conversations that will take place over the next three days.



Mr. Governor's Conversation with Dr Ngozi Okonjo-Iweaka, Director General, World Trade Organisation

Governor Babajide Sanwo-Olu: What has the journey been like so far?

Dr Ngozi Okonjo-Iweala: It has been a fantastic time though difficult with anxiety and uncertainty. Thanks to Mr. President and all Nigerians for their incredible support and encouragement, noting that now is the opportunity to showcase what Nigeria and Africa can do in such an international position. It will be very challenging but I feel ready as everyone says in every challenge there is an opportunity so it will involve seeing what can be done with counties around the world.

Governor Babajide Sanwo-Olu: Sitting back and looking forward, what in your opinion will a successful Africa look like and where do you think Lagos can sit in that context?

Dr Ngozi Okonjo-Iweala: A successful Africa should look at its demographics. With 60 percent of our population that is 30 years old and younger, Africa must worry about job creation. A successful Africa is one that is able to create decent and meaningful jobs for its teeming youthful population with peculiar needs. This will help to prevent social dislocations and unrest. Africa must move out of being exporters of raw materials to value-adding and processing hubs to be able to compete globally.

Gov. Sanwo-Olu: How do we industrialise?

Dr Okonjo-Iweala: Lagos has a critical role to play in the industrialisation of Nigeria. Nigeria. The state must venture into taking advantage of the big market to make Nigeria not just a consumer centre but a big manufacturing centre that exports finished goods to other countries. Lagos must also focus on the creative arts sector to unleash potentials for its critical developmental role. Lagos can explore the creation of medical tourism hubs in specialised areas to complement other African countries working on the same, for example Ghana.

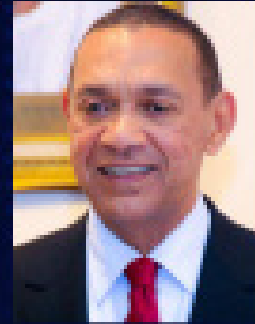
Gov. Sanwo-Olu: What are the pitfalls to avoid to make Lagos become more competitive globally?

Dr Okonjo-Iweala: Lagos needs to be more audacious in the next decade to achieve the Greater Lagos dream. Be innovative and proactive by trending with the dynamics of the future - Artificial Intelligence, tapping into the digital economy and e-commerce. Just like Korea, Lagos must ensure broadband access everywhere to be a functional smart city-state. Lagos must invest in the infrastructure of the future - telecommunications, steady and sustainable electricity supply, green economy, renewable energy. We must get our infrastructure right - infrastructure of the future. We must work towards providing steady sustainable energy, particularly green and renewable energy. Lagos must provide venture capital to SMEs to grow businesses and promote entrepreneurship.

Gov. Sanwo-Olu: What advice do you have for gender balance and youth development for the next decade?

Dr Okonjo-Iweala: Proud of Nigerian and African women for their capacity to multitask. Women must however be given a bigger platform to operate. Global statistics have shown that we are still far away from gender parity. Men must decide to deliberately empower women by giving them the needed opportunity. Lagos has done quite well in this regard, however the state should do more with championing the creation of opportunities for women to thrive better. Similarly, there is a need to make room for the youth to unleash their potential and take up leadership positions.

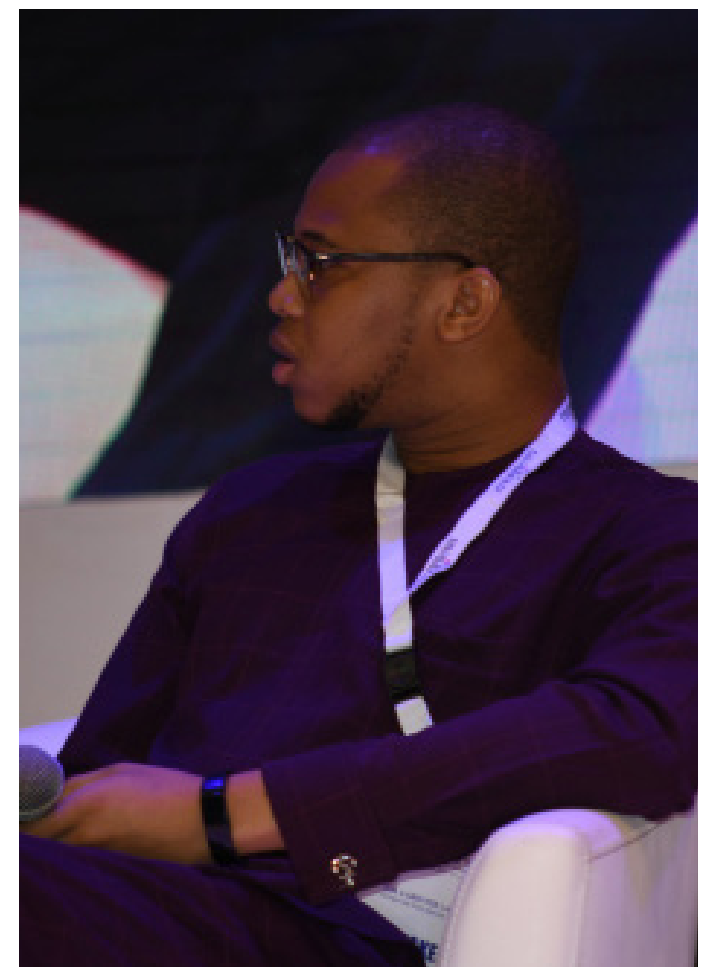
Issues And Challenges

Due to the difference in political affiliations between the Lagos State Government and the Federal Government between 1999 - 2015, policies by the State Government were stifled at the Federal level. This has however changed since 2015.

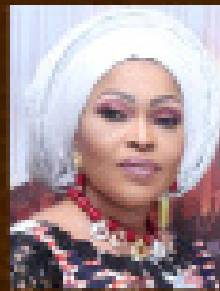

THE OFFICE OF THE CITIZEN – CITIZEN PARTICIPATION IN GOVERNANCE For a Greater Lagos



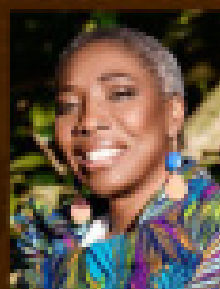

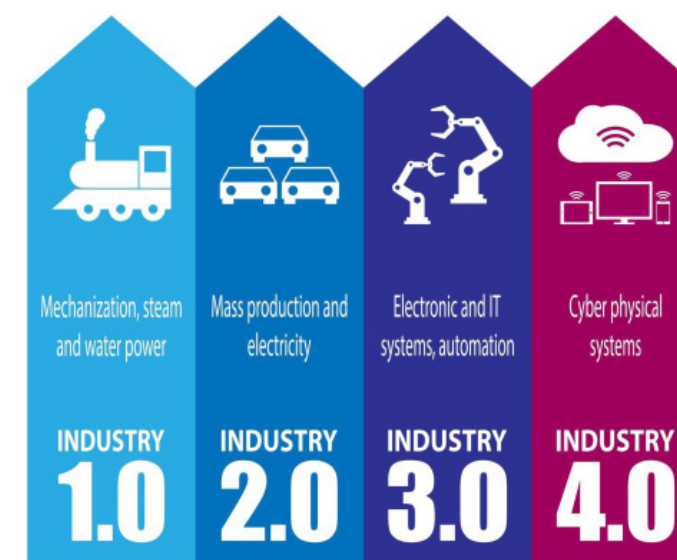


Background

Agenda - Technology and Education.

Promote Digital Entrepreneurship, link Hotspots with Broadband e. g. Schools, Hospitals, LGAs.

There must be regulation of Technology and the regulators must understand what to regulate.

Government should avoid being a “leaking basket” – to complete and showcase projects.

Government should adopt community-focused strategies and have an expansionist approach.

Innovators, stakeholders and Government should think big and leverage on individual community strength e. g. Yaba is heavy on schools, hospitals, rail services, institutions, entrepreneurs; while Ikeja is a digital, entertainment hub etc.

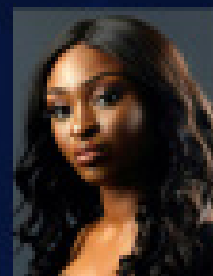

Background

Innovation enhances the uptake of technology for socio-economic development. With initiatives such as The Hub Activation, young adults can engage, collaborate and address germane technological/innovation matters arising in the society.

Innovation is at the core of infrastructural development in Lagos State. The Ikoyi Link Bridge, recommended at an earlier Ehingbeti session, is a notable example. Perhaps, the proposed 4th Mainland Bridge will keep the legacy.

Conclusions and Recommendations

Digitizing Education

The act of digitizing education is easy and difficult at the same time; and one cannot readily choose an area of the Sustainable Development Goals [SDG], rather the focus should be on tools that could be used to increase the absorption rate of young children.

Stimulating the youth in an enabling environment for capacity building for a Youth Technological Start up status by offering mentorship, providing financial start up link, fiscal tax incentives to aid innovation are the key tools that are very vital.

Policy & Regulation

Government should be consistent in driving policies to promote the use of technology because demand is available but needs to grow. Government should ensure adherence to laid down policies.

Government should also encourage and patronize local Enterprise Resource Planning [ERP] system developers and embark on e-governance.

Technology Drive in Lagos

Key ingredients required to unleash technology innovation in Nigeria

Evangelism of software companies via Summits. Total transformation of Lagos by spreading the idea that Start-ups are inevitable i. e. total shift in cultural and social attitude from collar jobs for Pensions to Start-ups.

Nurturing the Lagos technological hub

Branding – Because Lagos is synonymous with Smart City Development, the State should embark on e-governance to attain the status of a technology-driven State.

SKILLS & CAPABILITIES REQUIRED

Government should give thoughts to more flexible learning options by differentiating the skills set and specifically facilitate training for those skills, in other words, teaching Entrepreneurship formally is now a necessity.

Monetization of the skill set output by exporting our skills for money – Europe & Australia makes money from exporting their Medical Doctors [about \$20M annually]. Nigeria makes about \$7/8M from Oil & Gas which the country is dependent upon and would not be relevant down the line – 7 years. Diplomats in Canada train for the jobs, because they have target amounts they can make for the country.

Secondary School Exit Programme: PricewaterhouseCoopers [PWC] and KPMG did an online experiment to employ secondary school leavers for 5 years and they integrated seamlessly. This should be revolutionized in the State.

Innovation should be in the context of measurable policies to improve service and provide for the over 20 million residents of Lagos. Innovate to improve hours spent in traffic for example, measuring the movement from the 1st to the 2nd Industrial Technological Innovation Revolution in Lagos.

The Lagos Art of Technology [AoT] Summit parading several software designers interacting with the ecosystem to create and improve talent should be encouraged by providing the needed infrastructure, talent, funding and access to mentoring/networking workshops. There have been quite a number of Start-ups from the Lagos AoT 1.0 & AoT 2.0 summit - Eco 360.

Disruptive Technology for Lagos

What research and innovative mitigation is needed to guide against the Volatility, Uncertainty, and Complexity & Ambiguity [VUCA] scenario?

The Ministry of Education is the sector to apply all of the technology, and the government should practice consistency for policies by providing a single point of contact to drive the hub.

Software can be created anywhere and the Silicon Valley of Lagos is no longer the driving force, the direction should be towards Public-Private Partnership [PPP] to drive Vocational Training Institutions [VTC]. A combination of infrastructure investment to drive technological innovation.

Other Recommendations

Evangelism of software/technology companies. How can we rebrand Lagos to be like Estonia? This is a need to do.

Embedding digital technology in our educational curriculum; revamp of CodeLagos.

Fiscal (tax) incentives for innovators.

Education, Talent, Policy and Evangelism should be considered as critical components for disruptive innovation

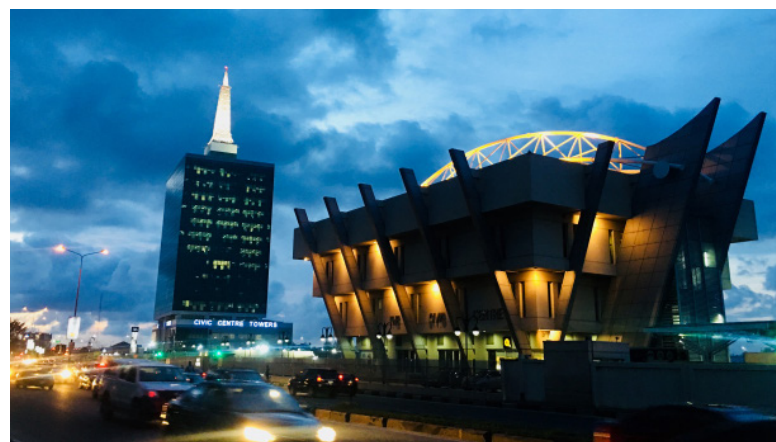

Background

According to the World Bank, Human Capital Development is one of the very important factors that is important to sustained Economic Growth. Regrettably, the Nigerian child of today would only achieve 36% of his/her potential due to the limited facilities available for Survival, School and Health, hence the need to pay more attention to Human Capital Development through the provision of proper Nutrition, Health and Education as important indices in enhancing Human Capital Development. Germane to the discussion is the need to review existing curricula, in order to make them relevant to the requirements of the 21st Century Economy. Considering budgetary provisions for Health (about 0.5%) of the Gross Domestic Product (GDP) and Education which is even lower, it is important to start conversing on Budgetary allocation to infrastructural investments that are tied to labour and productivity.

Issues and Challenges:

Non-Capitalisation of Budgetary Allocation to Education

A progressive budget is considered as one in which allocations to Capital Expenditure (CAPEX) is greater than Operating/Recurrent Expenditure (OPEX). Therefore, it is essential to properly record Government expenditure on Education as CAPEX, i.e. Investment in “Human Infrastructure” (which is to be viewed as other Infrastructural expenditure) noting its capacity to yield returns that will drive the economy of the future.

Considering the high rate of returns on relevant Education and the paucity of funds, commercialization of every aspect of Human Capital Development should be considered a veritable option.

It would be more effective to build an educational system whereby students can work while schooling (learning and doing), instead of a situation where children are exclusively put through schooling for about 20 or more years before being introduced to the workplace.

It is essential to remodel the Education System to suit current realities and future requirements, rather than “optimizing obsolescence” in the Sector.

Non-Recognition of Relevant Education / Human Capital Development as important for effective participation in the economy.

Knowledge, ability and intellect are required to participate effectively in the economy and these can only be obtained through acquisition of relevant skills/education. Also, it has become imperative to redefine the essence of education by asking such questions as:

- Why send children to school?
- What are we going to teach?
- Who is going to teach?
- How are we going to teach?

Every child should be given an opportunity, “No Child Left Behind.”

Basic literacy is important for all, including challenged children, if only as a foundation to learning a trade.

There is a need to build the capacity of Teachers and develop their ability and suitability for effective impartation of knowledge.

Education System should be deliberately restructured to develop Technical and Vocational Education, instead of the practice of pressuring all Secondary School Leavers to attend the University. Provision of Adequate Healthcare and Proper Nutrition.

Human Capital Development cannot be achieved without adequate healthcare and Nutrition. The Standing Stunting Index is an indicator of measuring Human growth and development, of which nutrition is a factor, as a malnourished child can neither develop properly nor comprehend very well in the classroom.

Human Capital Development should commence from pregnant mothers through adequate antenatal care and nutrition.

Equally important is the neonatal stage, as only adequate care at this stage can produce a healthy Child that gets to learn, assimilate and acquire knowledge in the classroom.

Child Spacing and Birth Control is important in ensuring the health and well-being of mother and child.

Conclusions and Recommendations

Appreciation of the role of Nutrition in Human Capital Development

Child Nutrition should be tackled right from pregnancy through infancy, and before the commencement of schooling.

Regulation of Family Planning

Family planning should be regulated to curb the antithetical practice of giving birth to children with no economic plan in place for their growth and development.

Involvement of Parents in Teaching

Awareness should be created such that every parent takes on the role of a teacher, with provisions made for them to do this with ease.

Capitalisation of Expenditure on Education/Human Capital Development

Education is a profitable Investment with a high Rate of Returns, which could be funded through borrowing (commercial capital).

Deliberate encouragement of Inclusive Participation in Economy

It is necessary to encourage inclusive participation in the economy by establishing a reliable database of out-of-work/unemployed individuals at Local Government level, for necessary assistance on what they can do to contribute their quota to the economy.

Re-evaluation of Government’s Role/Involvement in Education

Government should seek to fund Education but does not have to be the provider of education, support the Private Sector in the funding of Education and engage the youth in the conversation.

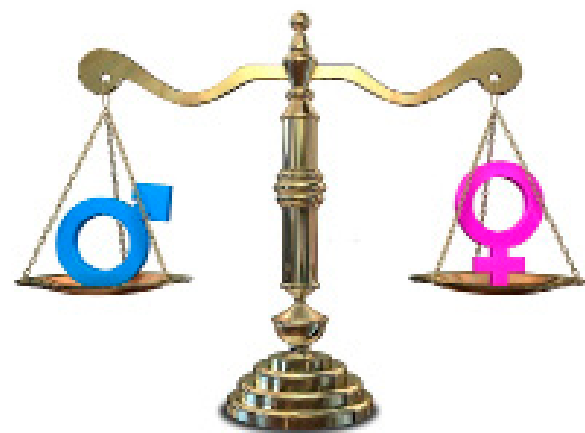

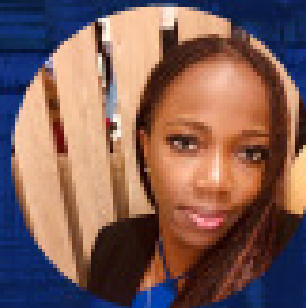

Background

With a population surpassing the 20 million mark, Lagos requires a functional and well-funded healthcare system.
How can the city-state achieve this? Raising investments for Lagos' healthcare sector through a Public-Private Partnership system can simplify the process for the Government.



Conclusions and Recommendations

Integrated health system and standard. These provisions will propel the increase of medical income.

Formulation of health policies to strengthen the health sector. For any policy to be effective, it should involve transformation and allow for, increase in Medical Personnel and Improvement and increase in Infrastructural facilities in the sector.

The Private Sector should be encouraged to invest in the Health Sector and incorporated into the Public-Private Partnership scheme.

There is a need for inclusive Health Insurance for all. Conflicting Government Policies does not encourage Private Sector participation, therefore the Private Sector should be carried along in Policy formulation and changes.

Ease of doing business should be improved and incentives should be provided e.g. provision of land and ensuring that Primary Healthcare institutions are functioning optimally.

Lagos State should leverage technology to achieve better Healthcare Delivery. The state can achieve this by:

Creating a well-publicized awareness at the grassroots level as this is an essential tool for sensitization and advocacy. This would enable citizens to become more aware of the types of healthcare available to them.

There is a need to upskill and reskill: research and development should be encouraged to predict diseases and cure.

Telemedicine should be encouraged.

Adherence to prescriptions should be encouraged.

In order to achieve the state's Health Financing dream, the following provisions are essential:

The people should be ready to pay for health services.

Stratification of pricing for healthcare according to income bracket.

Digitization of processes to allow faster access to healthcare delivery.

Target communication to reach specific people at any point in time.

Implanting a sustainable resource mobilization approach for the State Healthcare delivery system is crucial, despite limited resources. How can the state go about this;

Having a policy of prioritizing Healthcare.

Making efficient use of allocated resources.

Healthcare allocation should be increased.

Raising focus on expenditure management.

Strengthening relationships with donor partners to improve Healthcare delivery

Discouraging corruption.

Making policies and directions work in the sector demands the following steps;

Various constraints should be looked into at all levels.

Democratization of accessibility to health care should be considered.

Current direct investment should be improved upon and encouraged. There should be some collaborative efforts with all arms of Government and the Private Sector.

Areas requiring incentives and support

Long term funding for the health sector.

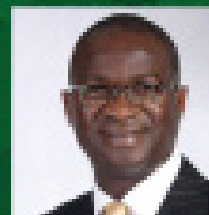
CONCLUSIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Participants made the following contributions during the session:

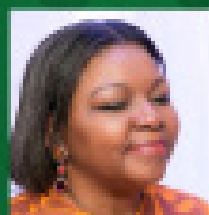

FUNDING GROWTH SUSTAINABLY

Provision of infrastructure for the populace is one of the core mandates of the State Government. The citizenry expects that their quality of life will be positively impacted by every administration whose early days are attended by promises around the provision and improvement of access to basic infrastructure such as transportation (mass transit, roads, rail, bridges), potable water, adequate healthcare and good quality education amongst other things.

ISSUES AND CHALLENGES

- **The enforcement of Law and Order as bedrock of Infrastructure Development:** Government must show a clear unambiguous commitment to enforcement of law and order as no growth or Investments would be recorded in the midst of lawlessness.
- **Funding Sources for Sustainable Infrastructure Development:** The state should explore the under-listed emerging sustainable finance

Structures:

- * Blended Finance
- * Public-Private Partnerships (PPP)
- * Domestic Infrastructure and Project Bonds
- * Specific Infrastructure Bonds and Specific Securitization
- * Export Credit Agency (ECA) Financing
- * Loans and Bonds

• Digital Economy:

One of the problems of the Nation and indeed Lagos State was the burgeoning young population which needed to be engaged, have jobs and contribute to the economy. On the other hand, the youth have created investment opportunities around technology. Nigeria has become a magnet for tech investors especially in the Fintech space. Renewable energy research could also solve the Nations intractable power problems.

• Commitments from the Bank of Industry:

The BOI is keen on supporting intelligent young men and women in Nigeria to develop applications and programmes that are winners all over the world. Technology hubs are being constructed in every State of the Federation to this effect. Also, BOI is willing to fund State Government Projects to the range of \$200-300M.

CONCLUSIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

• Recovery From Economic Downturn:

- Government must take a hard look at expenditure and immediately reprioritize because not all sectors were equally impacted. Events/Events Management businesses were affected as well as Private Education ventures and the large entertainment industry. Government would do well to extend some incentives to these entrepreneurs that would ensure that their businesses don't undergo permanent damage.

- Government might have to sell non-core assets to generate resources that would fund public expenditure. Government should also consider borrowing within fiscally sustainable limits. The economy must receive steady stimulation so that growth can happen, no matter how minimal.

- New taxes should not be introduced, instead, the existing tax net should be widened. The Revenue Stakeholders' meeting which used to hold monthly should be reintroduced.

• Project Financing:

- The State needs to establish a Sustainability Bond framework covering:
 - * Use of proceeds
 - * Management of proceeds
 - * Project evaluation and selection
 - * Reporting and external review

In order to leverage public sector funds, the same framework should be adopted. Also, the same framework could be applied to DFIs and NGOs. The framework would allow the Government to examine priorities, investment opportunities and sectors that need to be driven along with expected outcomes and targeted benefits that can be derived. Government should undertake a range of projects aligned with the commercially viable SDGs.

• Making Lagos Attractive To Investors

- Government should consider the following actions to make the State more attractive to investments:
 - * Enforcement of law and order (security)
 - * Restructuring of its finances
 - * Transparency and accountability in terms of its financials
 - * Identification of areas of interest of investors
 - * Sustainability and securitization
 - * Presenting itself as having the streams of income/cash flows that can service the loans
 - * Positioning from a Governance perspective. The "G" in the Environmental, Social, and Governance (ESG) Criteria is critical to attracting long term funding.

• Digitise Lagos

- The Residents Registration should be continued as an effective way to gather data on Citizens. The role of data is extremely important.

Government should be commended for pursuance of fibre optic connectivity across the State and reiterated the need to improve data collection, identity management, house numbering, and property identification among others.

These data in Government's possession should be upgraded, and digitized, and a full harmonization of all available portals would help with the identification of citizens.

• Enabling Environment for Sustainable Development

- * Objective data should be used in the consideration of State priorities because what cannot be measured, cannot be managed.
- * As a fallout of the Coronavirus pandemic and the EndSARS protest, it has become imperative that the Health Sector needs to be supported and security must be strengthened. Government must support MSMEs.
- * Government should work on re-establishing the competitiveness of Lagos State as an Industrial Hub. Many industries have relocated to more welcoming neighbouring States leaving only their Head Offices in Lagos. Government should also strive to meet the basic infrastructure needs of the ever-increasing population.
- * Lagos State Government must have the internal capacity to manage Lagos.

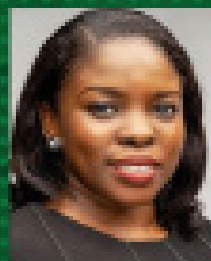
Participants recommended the following ;

- Lagos should be more innovative and breakaway from the norm. The creative arts sector and tourism has been identified as a potential revenue earner for the state and it is mostly unregulated and therefore under exploited. This should be remedied.
- The new curriculum should emphasize skills acquisition such as critical thinking, innovation, creativity, and leadership at the primary and secondary school levels with the objective of making them terminal exits and tertiary education being optional.
- Frequency of training and assessment of teachers should be increased and tailored towards the new vision of the State for its primary and secondary schools.
- A system that encourages shift in teaching practices and learning outcomes should be institutionalized. The state already has global examples to copy from and adapt to its vision without having to start from scratch as it were.
- There should be a reconnect between the educational system and the industry which means the products of our educational system, human and material, must be relevant to the needs of the private sector which would translate to national development.
- Involvement of the Private Sector in the formulation of policies in education. - Increase spending on education to meet the UNESCO standard of 26% of the total annual Budget.
- Increase spending on vocational schools.
- School administrators should identify and collaborate with Industry participants willing to support academic learning and research.
- Introduce job and career fairs into the curriculum.
- Transparency and accountability in our educational institutions, by the publication of annual reports of our individual education institutions. This would require a degree of autonomy which may need to be legislated. This is a global industry practice which improves access to private funding particularly from international donors. There is the example of the Eko project funded by the United States Agency for International Development (USAID).
- There should be regular institutional, faculty, departmental and guest lectures. The State Government should establish a Career Development and Skills Acquisition Department in the Ministry of Education to holistically coordinate career development options between our educational institutions and the private industry.
- Commitment of the State to develop a durable infrastructure.
- Develop more mono-discipline, Tertiary Institutions through policies that would incentivise private sector participation.
- Encourage and incentivize investments in the education sector.

Changes to the way we live and learn demands having a functional educational system in place. Restructuring of the system is inevitable for the right kind of impact.

From the public to private sector, everyone has a role to play. Stakeholders have to work together to develop a curriculum across board. The achievement of the global Sustainable Development Goals is a critical deliverable that every national and sub-national entity must continue to work at in such a way that, living today, we ensure that we think of the lives that would come tomorrow. Hence, the need for sustainable state programming anchored on resilience and impact. Sustainability is the capacity for our tomorrow to benefit from what

we do today, while resilience is about the capacity to rise from adverse situations. Both of these would eventually be tested through the impact on the communities, particularly the youth, the poor and the vulnerable. The need for sustainability, resilience and impact, particularly for an aspiring smart city like Lagos, cannot be overemphasized, as it looks ahead to the next decade.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- **Government must continue to forge partnerships with all critical stakeholders in the Public and Private sectors for economic growth and development.**

The capacity for growth and development, particularly the achievement of the SDGs and the “Lagos in the next Decade” aspiration is beyond the unilateral capacity of the government. Lagos must be responsible, strong, audacious and conscious in engaging and partnering critical stakeholders.

- **Funding is critical for economic development. The Government should maintain the culture of encouraging alternative sources of capital for development purposes and for building resilience.**

LASG must continue to seek ways to entrench the principles of circular economy as it remains the single most profitable and sustainable economic system of the 21st Century.

Government must prioritise Small and Medium Enterprises (SMEs) and put them in contact with impact investors and other such alternative funding sources that can lend below market rates to enable them function sustainably. LASG must continue to strengthen existing partnerships with the Private Sector to mobilise capital as well as continue to review the ways of doing business and approaches to providing incentives and support for business owners to thrive.

There is a need to explore alternative sources of funding, like impact investing, to create an ecosystem for funding.

The State must also continue to use the instrumentation of budgets to ensure service delivery, thus earning the full support of governance stakeholders. Government must consider the abundant value in the water bodies around Lagos to bring about the development of aquaculture.

- **There is a need for the wholesale adoption of technology if the aspiration of Lagos becoming a smart city is to be achieved.**

Government must benchmark global success stories in the deployment of technology to provide solutions to societal challenges.

Lagos must continue to adopt comprehensive approaches to reaching the smart city, with particular reference to achieving the SDGs.

Lagos must continue to covet success stories all over the world like the vertical farming in Singapore, a city smart in moving its traffic, securing its society, deploying technologies and providing power to its citizens.

- **Government must consciously find the means to include all stakeholding segments of the society into its planning processes to ensure ownership and support.**

Government must work with critical stakeholders to invest in the youth to serve as a springboard to unleash the potential of young people to create and become engaged. The need to critically address the needs of the critical sectors of the economy should be paramount. To this end, the Government must consider bringing in the youth population, the poor and the vulnerable in society on to the planning table with a view to achieving sustainable inclusion.

- **Government must continue to manage resources prudently to remain competitive.**

Government must continue to be open, transparent and be willing to strengthen the Public-Private Partnerships across the entire gamut of governance. We must focus on production and making public goods and services available at low costs to improve inclusiveness.

- **Government must transit from the rhetoric of promises to action.**

Government must be implementing actual programmes that would impact the lives of stakeholders through opportunities for vertical integration, for example through what is currently being done in the proposed revamping of the moribund National Theatre by the Bankers Committee.

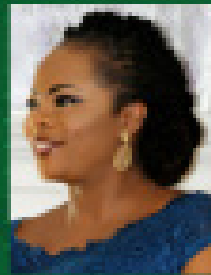

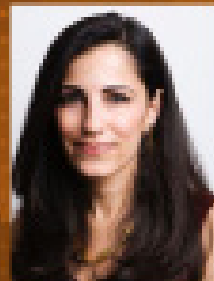

CONCLUSIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

- The State disaster preparedness should be designed along the THEMES agenda because of its versatility in aligning not only with the state vision but also with SDGs.
- Disaster Management Trust Fund should be set up to assist collaboration between agencies in disaster preparedness.
- Testing of solutions should be deemed mandatory for simulations and feedback to tweak solutions that will demonstrate preparedness.
- Capacity programs for cities to build awareness in ocean plastic and waste management
- Holistic approach to address the issue of ocean plastic.
- Working with some organizations that will provide funds for research into innovative tools used in resilient city management.
- There must be sincerity of purpose to implement solutions that have been collectively designed.
- There must be a willingness to experiment.
- Government must create an enabling environment.
- Utilizing the plans and strategy documents (for example the Resilient Strategy Document) produced over the years.
- Learning from and giving back to other cities.

Positioning Lagos for the next decade rests on collaboration and partnerships.

With these factors, Lagos can work towards sustainability and make appropriate plans for the future.

Background

Small and medium businesses and informal enterprises make up a significant portion of the economy. How can these be harnessed for trade and economic independence?

Issues and Challenges

- Current infrastructure is not enough to power growth and drive the ambitions of Lagos
- Congestion on Lagos roads and the inability of Government to fully diversify the public transportation system to include rail and water
- No enabling environment that could attract partnership and investment in infrastructure
- Need to improve concession framework and Public-Private Partnership.
- Need to improve ease of doing business in Lagos, especially as it relates to registration of business
- Lack of financial inclusion and payment automation

Recommendations

- Energy support: This could come in form of power plants, distribution, digital, domestic, solar; represents infrastructure that attracts people to the city.

- The population of Lagos is bound to double in a few years down the line, thus creating further pressure on the city. The city must therefore have at least a 50-year energy plan to serve at least 40 to 50 million people.

- There is also the need to create a clean and sustainable energy programme that is reliable and affordable.

- Opening up Markets: The State has the advantage of proximity to other ports in West Africa.

- A strong transportation link that covers the road, rail, air and water channels is essential.

- Also, policy guidelines that would encourage better use of other means of transportation aside the road to reduce congestion. The State should provide an enabling environment that can attract partnership as well as continue to improve concession framework and Public-Private Partnership.

- Demand and Pricing: Getting consumers to pay for infrastructure can be very challenging as they believe that it is the job of the government to provide them free or at a subsidized rate.

- However, infrastructure is expected to provide a stable return though some projects are difficult to finance or construct. Some are easy to refinance.

- Therefore, the State should compare projects that are more economically viable with those that are less economically viable but have social benefits like medical infrastructure; and prioritize expenditure accordingly.

- Policy: Consistency of policy is essential to PPP so that investors can have confidence in partnering with the State. Unexpected changes in policy could be harmful to partnership.

- Trade and Investment: The future of Nigeria in the trade and investment space is tied to that of Lagos in an inseparable manner. Trade and investment are like two sides of a coin. Hence, an investor considers establishing strong trade acceptability of its products and size of market before investing.

- Ease of Doing Business (EODB): Though Lagos has the advantage of a large market but there is the need to work on the challenge posed by ease of doing business in its terrain especially improved infrastructure. Lagos competes with other cities not only in Nigeria but also the rest of the world. Going by the last publication of the World Bank on EODB, Lagos accounts for 77% of Nigeria's rating on EODB. While Lagos was ranked 2nd in Nigeria her weighted rating globally was 28 largely owing to registration of business.

- Lagos being the economic hub, industrial hub, and technological hub – has the highest concentration of technology-savvy population because of availability; the state should leverage on this advantage through closer engagement with the public.

- Build viable economic communities: This involves building production clusters e.g. entertainment, maritime, technology and so on that will produce quality skills that address required needs to sell in Africa. Sourcing for inputs and partnerships locally like the initiative that birthed Lake rice, and extend it to other cities in Africa.

- Build a highly productive workforce: A highly productive workforce that is relevant and plays a key role in each of the clusters can drive the initiative and make Lagos a great beneficiary of AfCFTA.

- Promote business-friendly environment: The promotion of transparency in payment of taxes, trade relations, accountability, ease of doing business, digitalization of businesses, automated land registration and incentives like quality infrastructure will ultimately enhance the growth of businesses in Lagos. We need to match our business with other businesses in Africa right from the Local to the State level to ensure that all that we take to the market is acceptable.

- Build a strong Brand: Lagos can build a strong brand across the world through a stronger ambition to engage in trade relationships with the rest of Africa and beyond. Also, efforts need to be put in place to ensure that every local government in the State is known for something economically viable.

- Ease of doing business: A free trade zone, like in Rwanda, where entrepreneurs can build, test and market ideas need to be created as well as freedom of innovation.

- Demand for Skills: Create an environment that captures demand for skills through quality education and an ecosystem for investment.

- Market Accessibility: Accessing the market i.e. strong transportation link especially the last mile mobility e.g. the motorbikes (okada).

CONCLUSION AND RECOMMENDATIONS

- Digitalisation of the payment system.

- Product Visibility: Support for e-commerce.

- Improved collaboration with the Federal Government.

- Regular interface with business practitioners to get necessary feedback on how to better support investments.

- Reform of some government institutions that relate with private businesses, especially SMEs, for better outcomes.

Background

This session facilitated discussions about Lagos industrial hub and how the challenges it faces can be addressed. Key challenges as shared by discussants are the need for better quality roads that will improve efficiency and running cost of companies, and the need for the government to create an enabling environment by investing in human capital, infrastructure and technology.

Issues and Challenges

- General lack of understanding of the needs of the stakeholders and ways to tap into those sustainable opportunities from the State Government.
- Human capital challenge and the restrictions pertaining to women working night shifts.
- Significant development in human capital
- Lack of an enabling environment. Investments needed in human capital, infrastructure and technology.
- Absence of critical infrastructure like transportation, roads, power and digital education, that will make SMEs in Lagos competitive.
- Congestion of the Ports in Lagos.

CONCLUSION AND RECOMMENDATIONS

- Lagos State Government should understand the need of stakeholders in the cities and deploy ways to tap into those sustainable opportunities.
- To harness growth, women need to be empowered.
- Laws pertaining to industrialisation should be more flexible and gender-friendly.
- Removal of trade barriers for European companies will further increase the ease of doing business in Nigeria.
- SMEs must be competitive. Lagos must ensure the provision of critical infrastructure like transportation, roads, power and digital technology.
- Lagos can employ creative ways for SMEs to thrive with the creation of a 'Lagos Hub', similar to London Hub, to help boost partnership with educational systems like Lagos Business School and other experts to provide respite for SMEs
- Creation of a forum for SMEs and angel investors to connect
- The state needs more roads and better roads. It is not a new subject; more distribution terminals should be created. The roads leading out of Lagos state must also be continuously developed.
- Ultimately, roads should be prioritised, particularly access roads. If the access roads could be optimised as soon as possible, the physical completion of the ports shift will be completed ahead of schedule.
- Lagos State should understand the different needs of stakeholders in the cities.
- The removal of trade barriers for the European companies will further increase the ease of doing business in Lagos.
- SMEs need to be very competitive, and Lagos State can make them competitive by ensuring that a number of key infrastructure needs are all very clear like transport, power, digital etc. making sure that the SMEs are all operating at a good profit margin.

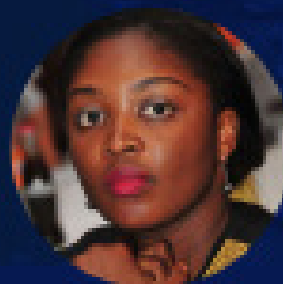

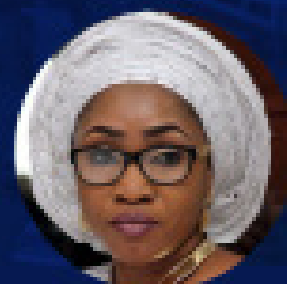

Background

The need for the State Government to pay more attention to exploring and investing in the structural, infrastructural growth and development of the Media, Entertainment, Culture and Tourism Sectors being a large employer of Labour is a crucial need. Relevant stakeholders have to be engaged in policy initiation/ planning and implementation in line with global best practice. Access to funds should not be left to the commercial banks who are most concerned about profit. Lagos needs to be more creative in its approach to investment in the talent space through cross-pollination of the market.

Issues and Challenges

- Failure of government policies to achieve desired outcomes in the Media, Entertainment, Culture and Tourism Industry

- A N1bn intervention fund is domiciled with the Lagos State Empowerment Trust Fund (LSETF) as part of efforts to improve access to finance in the industry. This fund is yet to be accessed to its fullest and there is a general lack of awareness about the fund in the industry.

- Inadequate infrastructure in the country limits the potential of the industry.

- The industry cannot do without power but the cost of individual businesses supplying power is unbearable.

- Government is yet to fully understand the industry and articulate its objectives.

- Government bureaucracy (bottlenecks) in accessing existing infrastructures.

- Large gap between the formulation of policies and execution of these policies.

- Lack of investment in physical structures which is needed to attract tourists, create jobs and drive the economy by both the government and industry players.

RECOMMENDATIONS

• Policies that can grow the Media, Entertainment, Culture and Tourism Industry?

- Foster stakeholders' participation in policy formulation and implementation.

- Encourage Public-Private Partnership in the development of the Sector.

- Establish a Lagos State Tourism Development Fund.

- Creation of Tourism Divisional Offices across the State.

- Continuous funding of the sector with a view to encouraging investors.

- Creation of a "Lagos Movie Village" intended to accommodate more than 20,000 Audience.

• Creative opportunities for the growth and development of the industry

- Need for a global and inclusive approach to addressing sector challenges.

Cross-pollination of the marketplace and the need to make funds more accessible.

- Need to be more creative in the formulation of policies.

- Government should invest more in physical structures and equipment.

- Government regulations should discourage multiple taxation.

- Government should create an enabling environment for businesses to thrive to avert loss of talents.

- Lagos should strive towards becoming a destination marketplace for investors and tourists.

• Structural & infrastructural solutions that could help propel the increasingly global sectors to greater prominence

- Need to transfer skills to the Youth.

- Government should be acquainted with the modus operandi of the entertainment industry.

- Government seed funds should not be disbursed through commercial banks due to the cumbersome processes.

- Corporate involvement should be encouraged to reduce pressure on the government.

- Adequate sensitisation on Government intervention programs through sector captains.

- Government should work on new ways of promoting creativity and talent management e.g. Animation, National Skills Competition etc.

• Lagos State's role in the development of a conducive environment for the advancement of the Sector

- The National Theatre should be leased to the industry practitioners who will maximally utilize the edifice.

Background

In the annals of modern-day democracy, the rule of law rather than rule of men provides the basis for good governance. Hence, the social contract which existed between the government and the governed are made manifest in policies which usually evolve from a participatory process and willingness of the citizens to obey without element of coercion. Against this backdrop, the session elicited positions on how Nigerians can engage the government against alienation, distrust and attack on institutions of governance.

Issues and Challenges

- Intellectual debate on strong institutions, strong men and the Rule of Law.
- Good Governance and how best to bridge the wide gap of trust between the government and the governed.

- Judicial reform and impact on the justice delivery system in Lagos State.
- Legislative-Executive relationship and impact on good governance.
- The begging culture and impact on transparency and good governance.
- Salvaging the broken-down social contract between government and the people.
- Government policies and revenue motive.
- Strengthening of the Institutions.

Conclusions and Recommendations

- Strong institutions, not rule of men, are essentials for good governance.
- Strong men are prone to misrule and absolute power corrupts.
- Life will be short, brutish and nasty when rule of men shapes governance.
- Dynamism is the watchword of every system, hence, every institution should be prone to change.
- There should be a strong correlation between strong institutions and leadership for delivery of good governance and development (e.g. China and Singapore).
- Strong institutions are built by strong men.
- The implementation of laws requires leadership with strong conviction. However, strong leadership must operate within the confines of the rule of law.
- The gap between the government and the governed was traceable to the colonial era and its consequent effect on failed social contract between the government and the governed.
- Governments should rise up to its social responsibility by providing an enabling environment for its citizens to engage and actively participate in the process of governance.
- Government policies must be tailored towards addressing the interests and aspirations of the citizens with room for proper planning.
- Formulated policies must be well communicated to the citizens for wider acceptability and obedience without coercion.
- Need for a new order based on mutual and understanding between the government and the governed for a virile democratic system.
- Lagos has the best judiciary in the country, yet the service delivery is still not charitable despite the efforts of the State Government.
- Constitutional arrangement as well as accurate data still remain an impediment to efficient justice delivery system in the country.
- Justice delivery should be seen as a service to be delivered by the government to the citizens with high consequential investments and developmental impact when put in right perspective.
- Rejuvenation of the judiciary through the embrace of new technology in the discharge of its constitutional responsibility to the citizenry.
- Procedural process should be automated in line with best practices.
- Jettisoning of professional delay tactics in the course of justice delivery by stakeholders.
- The judiciary should look towards the direction of accessibility, rational and equitable justice delivery system for a better Lagos.

- Abolish the fancy dresses (Silk & Gown) operational in the Judiciary.
- Abolish excessive proceduralization in the Judiciary.
- Digitization of processes to reduce human judges in tandem with best practices.
- Reduction of time and public funds being expended on the process of justice delivery.
- The process of case allocation to Judges should be automated.
- The intellectual postulation that the Legislative arm is a string of the Executive arm evolved out of mistrust perspective and not a reality in Lagos State.
- The cordiality that existed between the Legislative and Executive arms were founded on consultation and deliberation from conception of policies to implementation and series of reviews. This must be sustained.
- Exco-Legislative Parley which allowed for stakeholders' engagement has become institutionalised and part of the working of government.
- Transparency of institutions would help to reduce pressure and gradual removal of the begging norm.
- Adherence to rules by Public Office Holders is a sine qua non to the norm of transparency.
- Conflict between the government and the governed is a universal trend and therefore not peculiar to Nigeria.
- Government must evolve a dynamic resolution mechanism with emphasis on quick dispensation of Justice.
- Citizens must have confidence in the justice delivery system and must be willing to seek redress in a competent court of law rather than taking laws into their hands.
- Restoration of family values and norms.
- Every policy of the Government is not driven by the motive to make money. However, where there is violation, the violator would be made to pay the deterrent fee as stipulated by law.
- Lagosians should learn to be law-abiding to forestall sanctions.
- Stakeholders should embrace competence and merit in the scheme of things.
- The institution should be strong such that citizens should be afraid to break the law.
- Stakeholders should collaborate to jettison the axiom that "laws are meant for the fools".
- Mechanism for thorough investigation of Public Office holders indicted of any wrongdoing.

- Government should encourage the use of social media as a feedback mechanism on public service delivery.
- Massive investment by government and other stakeholders in digital governance.

 - promote information availability, accessibility and effective feedback mechanism on government policies.

Automating the process of operation.

- Providing a clear-cut mandate for MDAs.
- Upholding a merit-based recruitment and appointment system into public offices.

- Both government and the civil societies must collaborate to work out a standard process of operation that promotes transparency.

- The tone of transparency must be set from the leadership with organizational capacity to drive it.
- The transparency paradigm must shift from morale to a business perspective for better results.
- Good governance requires all stakeholders to be responsible.
- Ministries/Departments/Agencies should have a clear mandate with required working tools to deliver.
- Establishment of consequence outcome to achieve self-ownership of success and failure.
- Government must be seen to be committed to various international transparency institutions' resolutions that Nigeria is a signatory.
- Government must continue to stand to consider and use evidence-based data for policy implications and necessary action.
- Government must continue to identify the specific corruption problem affecting investment resources and act accordingly.
- Government must continue to improve on all transparency compliance mechanisms.
- Public Sector Policy should take advantage of the gender disparity which tends to favour females as less corrupt than male.
- Improved Judicial System helps to promote institutional transparency.
- Institutional building is tasking and involves a long-term approach.
- The action plan for institutional building must cut across both the public and private sectors for desired results.
- Setting up of Key Performance Indicators (KPI) with appropriate support systems will help to achieve evidence-based institutional transparency.
- Benchmarking the institutions against international best practices will also stimulate evidence-based institutional transparency.
- Professionalization of the Audit System is also a right step in that direction.

- Deployment of technology to digitize operations in line with the policy framework of the government.
- Technology should be utilized as an effective feedback mechanism for government policies and institutional transparency.
- Technology should be utilized to create a level playground for all stakeholders to contribute to governance.
- Technology encourages participatory governance.
- Technology gives room for continuity of government programmes.
- Transparent institutions help to provide the path to integrity. For example, a clear-cut process and what is accruable to the Government would have been defined and achieved.



CLOSING SESSION

Goodwill Message

RESOLUTIONS AND KEY ACTIONS

Deputy Governor of Lagos State, Dr Obafemi Kadir Hamzat listed the following resolutions as the key insights from the three (3) days of intense dialogue over the future of Lagos under the theme
“For a Greater Lagos: Setting the Tone for the Next Decade”

1

Recognising that dramatic shifts have been brought about by the realities of the 21st Century as well as the roles of technology in all aspects of our lives, it is recommended that the Government continues to provide an enabling environment and support of technology hubs. Stakeholders requested the state to sustain the provision of venture capital to budding businesses and SMEs to boost their start-up capacity as well as sustain them.

We as a government, will look to deepen our work in this area through existing and new programs at LSETF, LASRIC, and the Ministries of Wealth Creation, WAPA and Youth and Sports Development and welcome collaborators to work with us.

2

The need to harness the power of the youths and to put policies and programs in place to unleash the potential of our teeming youth population was strongly highlighted. Policies must be robust and treat the youths as assets – and concerted youth-focused capacity building in digital literacy, STEM, the arts, entertainment, sports and other sub-sectors must be created by the Government in partnership with the private sector.

We recognize that they are different from us and capable of making their own way in the world – therefore, we must seek to understand them and how to adequately support them.

Another overwhelmingly emphasized point was the need to improve the State education system through a thorough overhaul of the curriculum with a view to providing an education that meets 21st Century realities thereby reducing youth unemployment.

It is recognised that Lagos State plays a critical role in the industrialisation of Nigeria, and indeed the success of Africa. Hence, the state was mandated to venture audaciously in projecting its brand, and taking advantage of the coming large, united African market.

Some of the conspicuous infrastructure development, especially increased road networks, housing schemes and optic fibre investments were appreciated and encouraged to be scaled up to cater for its demographic endowment. Stakeholders in Lagos must collectively invest in the infrastructure of the future i.e telecommunication, the green economy and renewable energy.

Given the importance of ease of doing business, the Government was implored to reinvent its processes and operations to improve transparency and accountability and secure the trust and confidence of stakeholders sustainably.

The State also needs to continue promoting accountability through responsible and responsive revenue institutions as well as prudent deployment of tax policy that can be accurately determined.

7

The invaluable role of data in economic growth and development was noted and the Government was enjoined to upgrade the functions of the Lagos Bureau of Statistics to be an independent, professional Bureau so as to boost data management for development. The capacity of the State to conduct rigorous qualitative and quantitative research must be strengthened.

8

Lagos State Government was commended on its commitment to gender balance in public appointments and advocated continuous improvement on it. The Summit also recommended paying greater attention to matters of women and children and emphasised that the Government must continue to pay attention to the inclusion of people with disabilities as well as the poor and vulnerable in the society.

With the establishment of our State Social Register and Social Protection Policy enacted in 2020, we will work to make the required social investments, alongside our many partners in the private, civil society and development sectors to meet the needs of our people. Above all, we recognise the place of citizens as critical stakeholders and commit to respecting their pride of place in our business processes and service delivery.

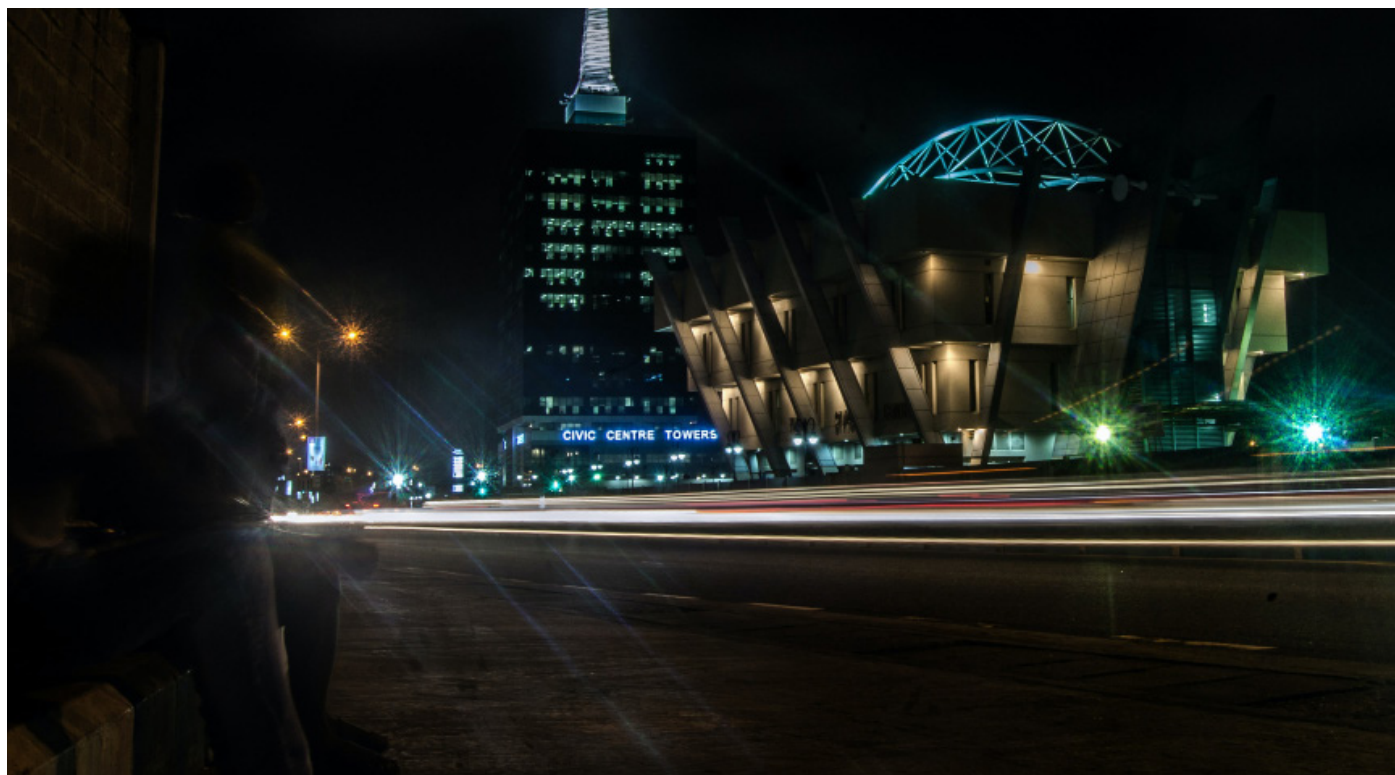
The State Government must continue to build strong law enforcement institutions, develop zero-tolerance for law breaking and indiscipline as well as hold its Public Officers accountable for unethical behaviour. Investment in technology to drive e-government, e-commerce and security must be intensified.

The current level of public enlightenment and publicity of Government's plans, projects and programs needs to be improved. There is a need to ramp up and find new ways of creating public awareness and improving participation in government programs.

ORIGIN OF THE T.H.E.M.E.S AGENDA

Why? Before the Sanwo-Olu administration delivered the project, residents endured harrowing gridlocks and prolonged travel time. That's a thing of the past now.



Commerce is sure to pick up in the area and connecting communities, thanks to thoughtfulness and putting the people first.

One more project that speaks to the State's Strategic Transport Master Plan (STMP) is the Oshodi-Abule-Egba Bus Rapid Transit corridor. Commissioned last August, the 13.65km corridor boasts an e-ticketing system and modern bus stations.

High and medium capacity buses ply the busy, strategic route daily. The biggest gain is the reduction of travel time by 35% for commuters.

ENTERTAINMENT AND TOURISM

On the global stage, Nigeria ranks as the second-largest film producer. Lagos is at the centre of it all.

Recent projects suggest Lagos has a firm grip on this demand. In February 2021, the Lagos State Ministry of Tourism, Arts and Culture unveiled the Lagos State Creative Industries Initiative (LACI). The initiative hopes to empower 1,500 filmmakers with free skills training. Barely three months later, Governor Sanwo-Olu announced a N1 billion seed capital to boost the creativity and tourism sectors in the state. It helps that the state is offering this form of support, creating jobs in the process.



MAKING LAGOS A 21ST CENTURY ECONOMY

Some two decades ago, Lagos embarked on a revolutionary journey. The step birthed Ehingbeti Summit, also known as Lagos Economic Summit, a creation that brings together private and public sector players to deliberate on the development of Lagos.

Between 2000 and 2021, Lagos has hosted eight (8) editions of the summit. The Babajide Sanwo-Olu administration facilitated the 2021 edition in February. Themed For a Greater Lagos: Setting the Tone for the Next Decade, the 2021 edition inspired a collage of resolutions from private sector leaders and policymakers.

LAGOS STATE WATERWAY AUTHORITY (LASWA)

Mr Dami Emmanuel:

It's nice to have you guys on. So, we are just going to go through this. We have about 25 to 30 minutes. You know how we are going to run. I give a background. Matt, you fly into what FCN is all about. KK, you come in with implementation, and then I just finally round up. Is that good?

Mr Matt Uzell & Mr Kayode Khalidson:

Sure.

Mr Dami Emmanuel:

Okay. Excellent. So, as you know, we all know where Lagos State has been. Lagos is the happening city in Nigeria, and we would say this is where everything happens in Nigeria. I

t's the heartbeat of the nation, even though that's not the typical name for Lagos. Lagos is the Centre of Excellence because everything we've always done, we've always led in the frontline.

So, for us in Lagos, the next mode of transportation that needs to be developed is waterways transportation. And the good thing about this right now is that waterways transportation is now being considered, not in isolation, but as an integrated transportation system where we also think about what's going on on the bus system and rail system eventually.

But as you know right now, we've had a fragmented service on the waterways system. We have issues around safety, we have several operators, and we have infrastructure which needs a lot of upgrading, and a critical component is also the private sector participation which is still missing in the whole ecosystem of the waterways.

So, with that, it was therefore important that we started to figure out how we get to achieve and drive private sector participation onto the waterways, because really, the government should be creating an enabling environment for the private sector to therefore thrive.

So, that becomes important. I guess Matt will be able to tell us how this all fits in as well.

Mr Matt Uzell:

Sure. Happy to. In 2015, the British Government created something called The Prosperity Fund which was a £1.3 billion pounds fund to support economic growth and development in emerging economies. One of the pillars of The Prosperity Fund was a program called The Future Cities program, which was specifically targeted at looking to ensure impacting urban and transport development of cities with a view to achieving impact on the ground for primary beneficiaries, but also looking to leverage British and international expertise in partnership with host countries expertise.

So, in 2019, ourselves in partnership with a number of reasonably iconic UK firms, for example; the iconic Water Transport Service in London, Beckett Rankine, University of Westminster, and a number of others, partnered with IDI Nigeria to deliver the program. So, we kicked off late last year and the program supports development in transport and urban centres in Lagos and Abeokuta.

With specific reference to the transport sector, I've been working in Nigeria for 20 years at this point, and it has always been a bit of a frustration to me over the years, given the intractable transport problems in Lagos.

There's this massive opportunity. Lagos, as we all know is built on a lagoon which traditionally is being barely used but easy for freight passengers or transport. So, there's a really significant opportunity there, but one way or another, the ducks haven't aligned over the years.

And so, right now, we are at a moment where the political will that the governor is pushing and transport is part of the theme's agenda and the British Government is fully aligned behind the development of Future Cities program, and we've got a pretty outstanding team of expertise on ground who have worked quite hard over the previous year to develop the outline business case. I don't know if that's a useful transition to pass over to Kayode to maybe take us from there.

Mr Kayode Khalidson:

Thanks, Matt. At the onset of the program, we sat with LASWA and we had extensive discussions with the GM, and he was quite concerned that over the years, there have been several studies done in the past, and none has really been focused towards delivering a transaction. So, we looked at the original reference for this program and we actually changed it to ensure that not only were we actually conducting studies, we were actually going to reach a point in the program when we actually intended to license operators and to concession a ferry terminal.

So, we agreed that we'd identify 4 key routes and these key routes were actually identified based on a certain criteria such as location, traffic, existing infrastructure, and also issues like accessibility to terminals. So, through that, we identified 4 key routes, and these key routes, we intend to license.

We also identified what we see as a jewel in the crown, which is the freight terminal at a place called Ijede, because obviously, due to the congestion in Lagos ports, we find that the congestion at the ports and also congestion on land lead to, the last time we heard, \$55 billion dollars loss in ports due to port congestion, and \$9 billion dollars a year due to congestion on land. So, it was these two issues that we thought that were very important for us to identify a freight terminal to concession.

And you know, by the time we now look at the model shift of transport from road, in terms of mass transit, onto ferry, and also from freight and the congestion in Lagos onto badges on the freight terminal, we are making a tremendous impact in terms of emissions, and also emissions reduction and the health and wellbeing of people in Lagos State. So, we actually assembled a team of international and local consultants, and as Matt has mentioned, Beckett Rankine from the UK working very closely with some local Nigerian consultants. And this nice blend of local and international consultants brought in the international knowledge mixed in with the local knowledge as well. So, throughout that process, we actually conducted a survey, but as you know we are affected by COVID-19, therefore what we had to do was to use the existing data which we gleaned from the previous demand study done by LAMATA and we were able to develop a supply side module based on the number of vessels that'll be licensed on each routes. There is a limit to the number of vessels to be licensed.

I think we identified between five to ten vessels we thought would actually enable us to create the demand module for the ferry operations. In addition to that, we worked very closely with all the key Lagos State MDAs. LASWA played a major role in actually getting together the office of the PPP and the Ministry of Waterfront

and Infrastructure Development, LAWMA — the waste management agency, Marine Police.

We all had several meetings in a stakeholder group that was broken down between the Steering Committee, which was chaired by the Executive Governor, the Technical Committee, which was chaired by the GM, LASWA, and the General Stakeholders Committee where we actually took into account all the issues that affect the key stakeholders in Lagos, because it was key to ensure that all the individuals who use the waterways right from various communities, the loggers and the market women and people with disabilities, all of them. We took all their considerations into account as we were designing this particular business. So, we designed an outline business case, and from the outline business case, we saw a 10% - 14% profitability on the key routes and about 30% return on investments on the freight terminal. So, I think, through this, we've been through a thorough process over the last 14 months, and I think we are well primed towards pushing to the next stage which is the actual transaction itself. So, what I've done is condense 12 months of very intense work in no less than five to six minutes. Thank you.

Mr Dami Emmanuel:

Thank you so much, KK. I think you've actually told us where we need to be and where we should be going right now and I think that's pretty much where we are. The licensing framework is actually ready now so that we can appropriately license. We've taken the fragmented operators who are currently organising themselves into a cooperative, while we also leave opportunities for potential private sector players who'll want to come into the industry. Regarding infrastructure, the state government has identified the cross-cutting functions which makes it clear that the ministry who constructs the infrastructure then hands it over to LASWA for operation and maintenance.

That has been clarified and it is being done. We've also been able to identify the jewel in the crown, and we've pushed forward with that jewel in identifying the area where it should be situated. The only thing that is going on right now is the road connectivity for that jewel in the crown is going to be very key, so the roads are being done to ensure that we can adequately move cargoes from Ijede to different points in Lagos State. Obviously, with the other stakeholders as well, continuous engagement is going on to ensure that indeed we don't have issues, both current issues and potential issues as well. Around safety, the safety code has been developed and we are rolling it out through what FCN has proposed to us. I think where we are right now, we are pretty much ready to get those necessary investments in.

Mr Dami Emmanuel:(continued)

The state government has committed and is currently working on a control room and further strengthening the emergency and rescue service, because these are things that investors want to see and they want to be happy that it's actually there to further reduce the kinds of risks they are exposed to. In terms of security, that's being handled by The Navy and The Marine Police, and I know that's something to be proud of. I mean, just a few days ago, NIMASA — one of the federal agencies, actually described Lagos State as probably the safest state in terms of marine in the whole of Nigeria.

And that's actually quite commendable for us as well, because then investors have more confidence to invest in waterways. So, having said that, I'll just give you guys a few more minutes to tell us if you think there are other things you might want to add or highlight as we have this chat. So, Matt, I will allow you to go first.

Matt Uzell:

From an investment perspective, there's clearly the opportunity to generate a significant return on investments through these projects, whether it's the freight terminal or passenger transport or whatnot. In terms of policy certainty, the Lagos State Government is lockstep across this. Mr. Governor has been championing this throughout. We spoke at length about the importance of the water sector at the Institute of Directors webinar a couple of weeks ago. Transport is an important part of the theme's agenda the Governor is pushing. It's clearly a priority, and with that, there's a significant political will behind it. From the Lagos State PPP unit, across the Ministry of Transportation, etcetera.

And that actually makes a big difference when you've got all the machinery of government pointed at the same target and all moving in formation. So, on one side, there's clearly a very tangible opportunity, there's policy certainty in terms of the championships from the Lagos State Government, and in terms of procurement transparency and effectiveness. Part of what the British government is doing in the Future Cities program is providing support and guidance in terms of structure in best practice, transparency and procurement process around, so that investors can be completely assured that the best practice is being followed through here. So, I guess my take and message on this is there's a real opportunity here.

It will be generally impactful for Lagos, it will generate a significant return on investment for investors, and the policy procurement transparency, and to be frank, from people involved in the design. The details backstop everything we are putting together on this. So, I'd encourage people to look out for opportunities and to get in touch with us if they'd like any other additional information.

Mr Dami Emmanuel:

Thank you so much. KK?

Mr Kayode Khalidson:

Yeah, I think what Matt has touched on is basically the political will. And you know, for us on this side of the table, we've advised both federal and state governments on transactions like this, and the biggest problem we've always had is the political will. But I must say, with the Executive Governor, the Commissioner for Transport and yourself, and also the key members within Lagos State, we have a group of individuals who are all working in sync and clearly have the combined political will to drive this program forward. And I think that is a major plus. Another major plus is the role of the informal operators. It's very important that we make sure they are an integral part of what we are doing, and they shouldn't be seen as any form of competition. In fact, they actually complement what we are trying to do, and as you are aware, over the last three months, we've worked very closely with all these informal operators to try and bring them onboard, and try to ensure that they do have a role to play. But under the new licensing framework, they'd definitely need to improve the safety, in terms of the way they operate, and also the professionalism. So, we are now moving towards the registering and licensing of these companies so that LASWA sits on top of a fully regulated sector.

What is also important from the work we do, as you are also aware, is institutional framework. We looked at the institutional framework and we are pleased to see the improved collaboration between LASWA and the National Inland Waterways Authority, which is a federal agency. I think that in itself clears out a lot of ambiguity between informal operators as to who was responsible for regulating the waterways sector. I think political will and the clear institutional framework are the two key things that give me confidence that we can go ahead with this transaction.

We are obviously in the time of global meltdown, in terms of COVID-19, however, based on Lagos State's drive to ensure that the ferry boats are actually assembled and built locally, there's an opportunity for growth in Lagos, creating jobs in Lagos which is absolutely key. So, even though we are living in a depressed market, there are opportunities for investors to come into this market and actually watch it grow because we know out of the 22 million passengers that ply on Lagos roads everywhere, only 1% is actually geared to waterways traffic, and through that, you can see a tremendous growth potential and that's what we are trying to tap. So, where are we in the transaction? We've actually done the OBC and as you are aware, we are now finalising the full business case, and then we hope that in the second quarter of this year, we can now move on to the transaction, and start to license the operators and to concession the terminal. Thank you.

Mr Dami Emmanuel:

Absolutely. You've basically finished the whole story and I think that's where we are in Lagos, ready to take on investors, and obviously, continuing to make sure that the enabling environment is tricked around. And I think what's very interesting is that we took into account local current realities, and especially, the local stakeholders who we've spoken about — the informal operators. It's an inclusive system, it's not a system that's pushing out anyone. It's to make sure that we complement each other, and Lagos State indeed offers that multi-modal transport system which has the bus and the waterways working, and we know that very soon, the rail is going to come onboard as well.

Right now, we know that we've put structure into the waterways system and we are just fine tuning for investors to then come in. Well, guys, I think it's been a really great chat, and I know that as the summit is going on, it's going to be a very insightful summit. We know that it's going to show Lagos to the entire world, and people will definitely be willing to come and invest in Lagos. Lagos has always led the frontline in Nigeria, and Lagos will continue to lead the pack, and not just leading but wanting others to follow behind so that we can have a united and prosperous Nigeria. Thanks, guys for this chat. I think it's been really insightful and people will gain from it.

TECHNOLOGY

Tubosun Alake:

I hope your day has been good, sir. I think there's quite a lot to talk about.

Hon. Hakeem Popoola Fahm:

Yes, quite a lot. It has been a good day. In this present administration, we do have a committed leadership. And when you look at the investments in technology, it has been unprecedented for the state. The government is committed to making sure that technology is at the forefront of all its activities. When you look at the team's agenda and the pillars, technology and education happen to be at the second level, but when you look at the framework, you'll see that technology is the bedrock.

It shows how committed this administration is in leveraging technology to do a lot of things, and we are seeing it, I know that trend is going to continue.

Tubosun Alake:

I think the role of technology cannot be understated in Lagos State, and testament to that is if you look at the 2021 budget and how technology plays a major role. Even going from last year to this year, the budget has more than tripled in its size, and we see that there's a lot of investment in the area of technology. When you look at things like trying to improve on education outcomes, health outcomes, the investment in physical infrastructure to enable different technological outcomes,

I think it's without a doubt one of the strong points this administration is trying to make in the entire Lagos ecosystem. I must say that the government is actively enabling the environment for technology players to play a greater role in the development of Lagos.

Hon. Hakeem Popoola Fahm:

I know we are doing a lot of research which is unprecedented within the state government. Give us the details of the activities we are doing in that area.

Tubosun Alake:

It's very interesting that you mentioned that, and I must say, I'm very proud to say that Lagos State had started one of the first structured-

-research intervention programmes anywhere in the federation. When we came into office, one of the first things we did was to activate the Lagos State Science and Innovation Council, and this council is responsible for intervening in science related activities across the state, especially with research. We understand that research powers innovations, right? And for us to be able to become a much smarter city, an innovative city, to become a knowledge hub, we needed to intervene in science research, and so one of the first things that the Governor did was grant the LASRIC council N250,000,000 (Two hundred and fifty million naira) for the various disciplines in research, and of course, more importantly or very importantly, to invest in innovative startups.

As I am speaking to you today, Lagos State has funded over 20 research initiatives across 4 different colleges of education and universities in Lagos, and has also funded about 20 start-ups, all with different areas of concentration; delivering services and products to various areas of the state. So, a lot of the research initiatives that we started, we are all monitoring them for patent applications, because as you know, patents signify that there's an invention or innovation which holds long-term value for the state, and as such, I think it's very commendable that Lagos State has started this programme that is quite unique in the federation.

Hon. Hakeem Popoola Fahm:

The government funded your research and we have started seeing some outcome. So, in the areas of employment and also innovation, can you touch on those?

Tubosun Alake:

It's actually very good that you mentioned that because, based on the interventions and the fundings that we did last year, about 35 jobs were created out of the many start-ups that we funded, and there was quite heavy investment in edu-tech, as well as in the different universities. One key result that we had last year was a partnership with the University of Lagos. We co-funded a ventilator, a very unique ventilator. The ventilator was built to accommodate our own unique circumstances in Lagos.

Tubosun Alake: (continued)

As at the advent of COVID-19, one of the things that was in short supply — in fact, across the African continent — was ventilators. And so, LASRIC took on the task of intervening and funding ventilator research, and as such, we came up with a unique ventilator design; a dual multi Ambu bag ventilator design, which right now is actually patent pending. The patent is in the application office, and we believe that the patent will be granted, and of course, it stands as a very unique innovation that was built in Lagos. This is one of the outcomes that LASRIC has seen over the past one year. This is all in pursuance of Lagos State's bigger agenda, which is the smart city agenda, and I understand that if Lagos is to fulfill its complete potential, the city needs to become smart.

Tubosun Alake:

Are there any certain initiatives you want to bring out in relation to the smart city?

Hon. Hakeem Popoola Fahm:

As you see, Governor Babajide Sanwo-olu is very committed to making sure that we make life easier for the people of Lagos State and part of that is to leverage on technology. If you look around you today, you cannot but see the rainbow of ducks being laid around the town. This is to provide an enabling environment so that internet access can be deployed throughout the state.

Now, we started with 3,000KM of fiber last year and we are going to continue to build on that. This will provide connectivity to the length and breadth of the state. We are going to reach schools, markets, public institutions, and most importantly, we are going to reach private industries because we have to make sure we provide that enabling environment. We are putting the trunks that there are going to be huge opportunities within the last mile. It's going to spur a large amount of businesses.

Tubosun Alake:

The smart city agenda not just has the outcomes you've mentioned — education and health — but it also has economic implications as well. When you look at the deployment of such a robust communication infrastructure, and you look at the elements of that project; the multi-coloured rainbow-like ducks that you mentioned, what this is doing is really democratising the space and enabling other private sector players to also play effectively in the market. One of the significant overheads for communication deployment is infrastructure work, and so, the state putting the money where its mouth is and investing, you know front loading the cost, enables players to reduce their cost of deployment, and even allows smaller players to compete in that department.

What that does is increase competition and better price for the consumers, and there's more activity within that space. So, economically, it's a very important project. One of the initiatives that we think is also going to support the smart city agenda, as you mentioned, is the open source projects that democratise software development and open up a lot of problem-solving to the wider development community. There are so many issues across the state, but we think we can leverage on the collective intelligence of our young people and on the collective intelligence of our developers and makers to really solve the problems of the state. So, the smart city agenda is multi-faceted in its approach and I think that, without a doubt, there is quite a bit of activity that will be going on.

Hon. Hakeem Popoola Fahm:

I know you have more to say about the partnership with the industry leaders; the likes of Microsoft, Oracle, SAP, and Google.

Tubosun Alake:

Thanks for that. In fact, just a couple of weeks ago, we were in discussions with GateHub, the open source repository company that was acquired by Microsoft, and we've been in talks with a number of other stakeholders. We've been in the Microsoft ecosystem, we've had discussions with Google as well, Oracle as well, and there are industry partners that are ready and willing to help drive the technology agenda for Lagos State.

And our private sector partners as well, the likes of Microsoft, we've been discussing about having access to their developer networks, same as Google, to have access to different benefits on their cloud infrastructure. So, a lot of these partnerships will be very critical and very key to be able to bring out the solutions that we require for the state. So, there's a lot going on and I believe Lagosians will start to see a lot of the benefits very soon.

Hon. Hakeem Popoola Fahm:

We have the foundation in place, so the next phase is to really look at the applications. We need to put in applications that will increase productivity, efficiency, as well as provide service to the state, because when you look at the way we are today, look at the population — 22 million people — we can't continue to do business as usual. We have to take new approaches, and that is to leverage the power of technology.

Dr. Tunde Sodade:

Okay, guys. So, we are looking at the Lekki Free Zone project from the perspective of the Lagos State Government, and how the project adds to the Lagos State Government's effort to boost industrial capacity and improve the value-added potential of industrial activity in Lagos. So, I'll start with Bob and then, Denish. Can you tell us very briefly how your project is contributing to this effort?

Robert Dickerman:

Yeah. Thank you very much, Tunde. At Pinnacle Oil & Gas, we've been in the marketing, retail and wholesale business of petroleum projects for several years now, but we recognised that there was a large efficiency problem in the area, in terms of being able to efficiently bring petroleum products into Nigeria — specifically, into Lagos — because of the shallow drafts and because of the delays that that causes on the marine side of the business. Shipping companies are charging large demurrage charges and there are large laytime costs. In addition to that, there is a lot of congestion because most of the terminals are in Apapa Port, and it takes about five days to load a truckload of petroleum products.

So, what we did in response is we made a major investment and a construction project to build a large distribution terminal on land, and an associated marines that are in deeper waters with very efficient pumping capabilities so that we can actually bring in much larger vessels that have never been able to be brought into Nigeria before, and reduce or eliminate demurrage charges. In addition to that, we can redirect the traffic from the very crowded and congested Apapa Port to the Lekki Free Zone, where we can get trucks in, get them loaded efficiently, and get them out and moving much more quickly. We can load 22 trucks at once.

And we think that this project alone that we are just about to begin operation on is going to have enormous efficiency benefits for the entire area, and frankly, for the whole country.

Dinesh Rath:

So, Lagos Free Zone is a very important development on the infrastructure side, which is an integral part of the overall Lekki Free Zone development. So, the Lagos Free Zone encompasses a port which is already in the process of being constructed. We are almost 40% done as far as the port project is concerned, and the port is deeply integrated into the overall Free Zone development. The Free Zone caters 830 hectares of land, and it's primarily meant for industrial and logistics companies, and the Zone is registered under Nigeria Export Processing Zone Authority, which means it's a special economic zone, and that means it has got all the components which comes with being a special economic zone in Nigeria.

So, we have ease of doing business, and apart from that, access to all the common utilities. Whether you call energy, warehouses, industrial buildings. We have fire stations, medical centers, truck parks, so the operators there can have access to all the services. So, that's what the Lagos Free Zone offers to the incoming Investors.

Dr. Tunde Sodade:

All these efforts that your companies are exerting in providing infrastructure around the zone, can you tell us a little bit about what impact you are having or planning to have in the development of human capital? The key requirements for meeting the objectives of Lagos State Government is the development of IT capabilities and technological capital for the area.

Another thing that we are looking for is the infrastructure itself, the hard infrastructure. Can you tell a little bit more about how the people of Lagos in general, and Nigeria by extension, will benefit from what you are doing from these perspectives?

Robert Dickerman:

The economic benefits that we are looking at are really quite massive for this project Pinnacle has just completed. In addition to the demurrage which I mentioned earlier — the delay costs for ships coming in — that alone is about \$200 million dollars a year in savings to Nigeria, which will translate into lower petroleum product prices at the pump.

In addition to that, we are looking at significantly lower laytime savings — laytime is the allowance for having a ship at port — contractual allowance that could save another \$100 million dollars a year.

In addition to that, there will be lower product losses that happen when they do ship to ship transfers, when you have to lighter a large ship to a smaller one at a jetty, and perhaps the larger benefit of all to Lagos, the port, the entire area, and perhaps the entire distribution system of petroleum in Nigeria is the reduction of congestion in the Apapa Port, because a lot of congestion we are experiencing today — the typical five days that it takes to load a truck would only take one day or less at the Pinnacle port in the Lekki Free Zone.

And when we take all of those trucks that are currently tied up in Apapa and we relocate them to Lekki Free Zone, it allows the Apapa Port to operate much more efficiently, and the container trucks and dry goods and all the other materials that need to move out of Apapa Port can do so much more efficiently, and with fewer delays and fewer costs. So, there are actually economic benefits to the entire country that are quite substantial.

FIRESIDE CHAT

TRANSPORTATION

Dr. Tunde Sodade:

Thank you. So, by way of government incentives, both federal and state, can I just ask if you are satisfied as investors and what other types of incentives you would like to see. Which ones do you use now, and is there anything we could do on the government side to make your work easier?

Dinesh Rathi:

So, in terms of the incentives, the special economic zones within the country are all falling under the Nigerian Export Processing Zone Authority act, and the NEPZA act clearly prescribes the way to administer a free zone in the country, and as part of that, we have single window clearance, the NEPZA office, customs and immigration officers at our economic zone, which then provides services to all the operators. It just plugs into the whole ease of doing business philosophy of the Federal Government. At the state government level, the State Government has been absolutely supportive in terms of whatever we have done as far as the project is concerned.

They have one of the biggest supporters and an important shareholder of that project, and because of their support, we are seeing this project coming to reality. And Lagos of course, in terms of support infrastructure, they have been working on the road network as well and that's a job which is in progress and helping us create a better ecosystem in the entire axis.

Robert Dickerman:

And for us, we would never have been able to build this without the support of many federal, state and local agencies. We had to get thirty permits to build this, we had to have the support of the Department of Petroleum Resources, The Nigerian Port Authority, and many other agencies in order to make sure that we are installing and operating a facility that will operate well and safely, that we have all of the safety measures in place, that we don't take any chances of an oil spill on the water, that all of the operations have been professionally managed and professionally handled.

And I think in terms of the investment and support that you asked about that we use to enhance and make this impact even greater, it really is on the roadside, it's if we have better and wider roads and we have better access so that the truck traffic can operate smoothly and efficiently.

That would make a big difference. Initially, we perhaps were fine with the way it is set up now, but for this to grow, which it will, we are going to need a lot of help on the roadside from the state government.

Dr. Tunde Sodade:

And you can be sure that the state government is working on it. There are quite a number of infrastructure projects in that axis that the State Government is working tirelessly to provide. Denish and I were talking earlier about the progress of the 7th Road, the Postal road, and the Ibeju-Lekki road. I can assure you that all these projects are on the board. The problem with infrastructure projects is that a lot is done on the drawing board before you actually move to the site. That brings me to the question of; How imminent are your operations? When do you see yourself starting or taking off?

Robert Dickerman:

Well, we've had a very expedited construction schedule, and we are actually ready to start operations and take our first cargo of 60,000 dead weight tons on March 1st, 2021. We are just about to begin.

Dr. Tunde Sodade:

In three weeks time?

Robert Dickerman:

In three weeks time, we are ready to go. We are going to be doing this and I think it'll have a large impact.

Dr. Tunde Sodade:

Dinesh?

Dinesh Rathi:

So, as we speak, we are currently in operation. Out of the 10 operating units which are there, 6 are in the manufacturing space, and they are already manufacturing and supplying products. Both for the export market, as well as the Nigerian market. Apart from that, the port which is the major project for our zone, will be operational by the end of 2022, and that would really be a huge catalyst, not only for our zone, but for the whole Lekki axis. So, in terms of operation, as I am talking to you, we are fully operational. The likes of Kellogg's, Power Oil, Dano Milk, Colgate are all operating as part of our development. Thank you..

Dr. Tunde Sodade:

And there you have it. Lekki Free Zone, contributing to the value addition of the industrial capacity of Lagos State. Thank you.

Dr. Frederic:

Being the smallest state, which is about 0.4% of the land mass, attracts a lot of people. So, we are currently about 22 million people, and we are about to grow to about 30 million by 2030, and 89 million by 2100. Where are we going to put them? We have to look for a much more innovative way of moving people from one point to the other in Lagos, and that's why we have developed a master plan which has a multi-modal integrated, the word "integrated" is important, transport system.

And the essence of the master plan is to give options, because when you look at what is happening around, people are captive to either danfos or captive to their cars. They don't have options. So, when the Third Mainland Bridge is shut down and you are captive to your car, you are stuck in traffic. People need to be able to have access to water transportation, the bus mode and the rail mode. So, the rail mode, what's the current situation?

Abimbola Akinajo:

Okay. Commissioner, you are absolutely correct. The solution to Lagos is not about building more roads or any of those things. You tend to picture growth that is huge, and when we look at that, we need to be able to move people. And the word you've used there is absolutely correct, it's about options. Traffic will never leave any city. All over the world, you've got traffic. It's about alternative modes of transportation, and I guess that's where you mention the waterways and you mention the buses, it makes people want to leave their cars at home and do public transportation, and the biggest mass mover is the rail system.

And so, that's why when you look at the master plan like you say, within that master plan, we have seven rail lines. Currently, the State Government is implementing two as you know — the blue and the red. Once we do those two rail lines, we'll have a huge relief in terms of public transportation and traffic. The two rail lines we are doing, for instance, the red one will move from Agbado to Marina. The first phase is what we are developing as we speak, and that is from Agbado all the way to Oyingbo. Now, when you think about the numbers that will do on a daily basis, it will have a huge impact, because to start

with, that whole corridor — based on the studies that LAMATA was done for instance — speaks to about 750,000 to a 1,000,000 passengers daily. And also, when you build a new rail system, you are bringing development to that area. So, when I look between Agbado and Oyingbo for instance, all the stations we are building in that area will generate some level of economic activity that will allow those areas in itself to generate more work and activity — commercial and economic activity in those areas, and it will make them more economically viable. So, for Lagos, it's a win-win situation. The blue line for us is a line that Lagos has been building for a long time, but we mustn't forget that this is the only sub-national that has actually been bold enough to build a rail system, and that rail system is a 27 KM system. For now, what the Governor has made sure will happen is the completion of the blue line. Now, for Lagos the opportunities are huge, because we've been doing this for a long time, it has looked to the world as though we were never going to complete, but in this administration, he has made sure by providing and ring fencing the funding that that will be completed in this administration. So, we are heading towards a 2022 start of operations, and that is the first phase of the blue line which is from Mile 2 to Marina. For that particular phase, we are looking at no less than 250,000 passengers per day, so yet again, we are talking about increased productivity and reduced travel time. If anybody knows that corridor —

Dr. Frederic:

That corridor is huge. I mean, if you look at what is happening, even the logistics on that corridor. You look at Mile 2, and just to get to Apapa alone is a nightmare. So, if you can take those people out of the road and put them on the rail, I think that would make a huge difference. To put structure around what is happening in the master plan, the strategic direction is first integration. They all have to be integrated. The second one is that public transport has to be affordable because we need to lift people out of poverty. The third one is to bring the private sector in, because we know that the government cannot do this alone. It's a huge investment, we are talking about over 25 billion dollars to fund the master plan. And then, most importantly, we need to modernise

Dr. Frederic: continued

transport systems. So, we are talking about the BLT. There are 40 BLT corridors in the STMP. We have 26 water routes, water is very important because 17% to 20% of Lagos is water, and it's amazing that we haven't optimised the capacity of the waterways. Also, we need to talk about the rail and its connectivity.

Abimbola Akinajo:

To speak to what you've said about connectivity and Intermodal systems, everywhere we have a jetty now, what the vision of LAMATA as directed by our transport master plan is to make sure we have bus-stops around there. So, outside of those major interchanges, every bus terminal will have bus-stops close by, so when you come off the ferry, you are not stranded. You'll always be able to find buses to get to your destination.

Dr. Frederic:

Let me even come in there. One of the downsides of water transportation is that it has always been isolated, so the connectivity has always been missing and so when people get to their final terminal, they are always stranded. So, they have to wait an hour or an hour and a half before they connect. So, what you are talking about is there will be a bus-stop, and then the various operators will integrate their time-table in such a way that we'd minimise waiting time to about five to ten minutes, in comparison to about an hour, and that makes water transportation even more attractive. And when you look at what the government is doing on the waterways, they have invested in over 9 jettys. So, we are renovating over 9 jetties, there's a lot of dredging going on. So, people will have the option of traveling on the road, and people will have the option of using waterways, as well as the rail.

Abimbola Akinajo:

I mean, it'd be fantastic for us, but you know, in tying all of this together, we are doing a single travel card for the whole of Lagos. So, when you speak about integration, there are all of the things that make it cohesive and functional, and one of them is being able to use one singular card to travel on all these modes that you described. So, the Cowry card will be a card that you can use on any mode of transportation. We are rolling it out on a regulated bus system now, and we are also going to use it on the rail when it comes to life, and we'll use it on the waterways. Waterways is slated to roll out on the 1st of April. So, really and truly, Intermodal transportation is the heart of our STMP like you say, and it is something that we are driving, and by midway of this year, we are looking to see amazing changes to our public transportation..

Dr. Frederic:

Let's talk about how we'll bring the private sector in, because that's huge. So, the government cannot fund the rail lines alone. We need the private sector to help, because when you look at the distribution of income, 80% resides in the private sector and the government only controls 20%. So, we have private sector participation in the rail because they'll buy the rolling stock and obviously operate the rail system. In water transportation for example, the Lagos State Government signed a memorandum of understanding with the British Government to look at how we prioritise roots on our waterways, and what they are doing is developing a full business case with a full financial model to demonstrate how viable the various routes are, and so that once we prepare those documents, we can then invite the private sector and attract them to buy vessels and run those various routes. So, that is going on on waterways. I know there's a lot of interest in our rail, and there's a lot of private sectors that are beginning to show interest in the bus reform. So, what's your experience with the rail and the bus mode in particular?

Abimbola Akinajo:

Let's start with the rail. Because we've been building this blue line for a long time, there's some sort of thought out there that maybe Lagos is not serious, and which is why Mr. Governor has gone out and made sure we have funding to complete the blue line.

What that does is it nails the fact that Lagos State, at least this administration, is serious about completing the rail lines. So, in doing that, we have put some level of investor confidence back into the system. Also, we have secured funding for the red line, so we are getting two rail lines that the Governor has provided funding for, we've worked with the banks — we have a number of banks that are helping us with these, and in doing that now, LAMATA has also gone out to the private sector to seek an expression of interest for the remaining four lines, and we've been inundated with responses. We have at least 20 on every line that has applied for it.

So, when you look at that, we have a large number of interests. For us, those are the other lines. Even with the blue and the red, the government will build the infrastructure; the six infrastructure, and all of it is due to be completed in the third quarter of 2022. And in doing that, we are also talking about bringing in the private sector to bring in rolling stock and to run and operate the system. So, those are going on, and I see a very healthy future for the rail system in Lagos. It looks like it'll be great..

Dr. Frederic:

And the bus mode is even better.

Abimbola Akinajo:

Yes, and that's because in the bus mode, we are currently working with the private sector. A number of them had been shortlisted, and we now have four private operators who work with Lagos State as we speak, and they have committed to bring in their own buses.

So, by the second quarter of this year, we will begin to see more buses. We have about circa 700 hundred buses now.

The vision is by the end of this year, we should have about 2,000 buses, high to medium capacity. Then, the private sector is also involved in the last mile, the government had put some spin in that game as well, and we are working with private banks to provide some level of funding to the private operators, and therefore, we intend to have roundabout 2,000 small sized buses for the first and last mile, all run by the private sector.

Dr. Frederic:

I see a huge potential in the transport sector for Lagos State. I'm very excited. I'm glad to be a part of this transformation, and we have to give kudos to the Governor of Lagos State for the commitment and political will he has shown in ensuring that this sector is developed to a stage where the economy becomes more competitive, and we can compete with other economies like London, Barcelona, et cetera.

Abimbola Akinajo:

I mean, like you say, any economy is hugely dependent on its transportation systems. It's when people move that they make money. It's when people move that an economy is driven. So, first and foremost, we must and we must, and the Governor is dedicated to that. When they see his agenda and its theme, that's the very first pillar..

Dr. Frederic:

And people day that transportation is the engine of any economy, and what he has done is to ensure that good people drive that sector. So, it's not business as usual where anybody can just come into the transport sector and plan.

There's a coherent plan in place, and there's consistency in the way the plan is executed, and you can see the proof of the private sector gaining a lot of confidence in wanting to participate in Lagos, and that's because there's a plan.

That plan is backed by law, and we've developed a regulatory framework which gives them the confidence that when they invest here, their investment is secured.

Abimbola Akinajo:

Yes. It's an interesting journey, and I think Lagos will become a whole lot better for it, and I'm excited to be a part of it..

Dr. Frederic:

Absolutely. Thank you very much.

FIRESIDE CHAT

REBUILDING LAGOS

Speakers:

Yemi Cardoso (Chairman, Citibank),

Yemi Cardoso:

It's a good time to discuss rebuilding. We all know the challenges ravaging all over the world. Quite frankly, it's not just Nigeria, it's everywhere. The pandemic alone has been testimony to the huge challenges that both government and private sector face all over the world.

And with those challenges comes a sense of responsibility, and that responsibility — if there's anything we've learned from the pandemic, it is that it cannot be the government alone, the private sector and all the different actors have to get involved. From these huge challenges of course, there's plenty to learn from successes in different parts of the world, and even with failures, there are things to be learnt as well.

So, I'm very delighted today to have a group of people to discuss the issues that have plagued the environment in the recent past. To kick off the conversation, I think it'd be nice to talk about those who have had a lot of experience in managing these sorts of challenges and bouncing back. Fred, I'd just like to crave your indulgence and get you to start this conversation and share some of the experiences you've had and you've seen from being out there in New York City.

Prof. Fred Olayele:

So, the topic for today really is to look at the recent crisis and how Lagos has really learnt from New York, but I'd like to approach the story of the day in the perspective of reinvention. And New York, we have that global capital of reinvention, and what does that mean? Throughout history, New York has successfully reinvented and made major changes in the global economy. And the story of New York is essentially about reinvention, and I'll cite about four to five examples here. In the Great Depression in the 1930s, the fiscal crisis of the 1970s, the 9/11, the global financial crisis, and New York City persevered and bounced back stronger. And the question is How? The proud demography, political and industrial shocks that shaped its history, the city's status as a global leader in finance, innovation and entrepreneurship has always enabled it to reinvent its industrial

structure to build a more resilient economy. Permit me to speak little about diversification here, because at the end of the day, it really comes to being able to effectively choose the strategies to diversify the economy, and a quick caveat is perhaps in order here. I've given talks a lot about diversification in Nigeria, and so when I'm talking about diversification in the Nigerian context, I try as much as possible to avoid using economic diversification because it's one of the most abused slangs, but I'm happy we are talking in a regional context here.

So, in the aftermath of the global financial crisis, traditional industries in New York increased presence, but as I have said earlier, as a leader in innovation and leadership, the city was able to identify the fact that Wall Street remains a key driver of investment. We then leveraged on this particular sector, our economic growth particularly in four bureaus out of Manhattan. Before the crisis, growth was essentially concentrated in Manhattan, but in the post-recession period, the revitalisation efforts of neighbourhoods throughout the city, especially outside Manhattan, have contributed significantly to strong growth, and even as the city became very resilient with 2008 state, its structure has evolved structurally over time and it has been able to recognise the benefits of the last decade.

So, while the recovery that we've witnessed since the 2008 crisis have been massive, I need to say that it has not been equitable because of the polarisation in the Labour Market, meaning that folks at the top end of the income spectrum continue to gain more compared to those at the bottom. What you then have is like a doughnut shaped economy where high income earners are at the top of the distribution while our ordinary folks at the lower end are struggling to make ends meet, and this is even complicated when you look at the structure of an urban centre like New York where affordability is a key issue, and then you talk about carnage. So, all of these nuances point to one thing and that is the fact that there are so many lessons that Lagos can learn from a super city like New York. The economic development approach in New York is based on the fact that

the city's economic strength comes from its diverse set of stakeholders, from domestic and international businesses, academic institutions, community-based organisations, private investors, and the public sector. These stakeholders essentially catalyse growth opportunities in existing and emerging industries in a bid to create good-paying jobs. The city's strategy again is beyond traditional economic development initiatives. Let me explain that. So, when you talk about traditional economic development initiatives, it's often about the growth of small businesses and legacy industries through real estate development or subsidies, but that's not what we do here.

In New York, we are very focused on developing, attracting and retaining talent. We recognise that human capital is the engine of growth in the knowledge-based economy that we are in and as the main driver of our business location decisions. So, what we've done here is to build a strategy around the city's competitive advantages. Many do not realise it, but New York is actually a coastal city, and from time to time, when I do analysis research and policy initiatives, Lagos is always in mind.

So, here in New York, we have over 600 miles of densely populated coastlines, and four out of five bureaus are located on islands. So, as the city becomes increasingly dense, more and more people are moving to the waterfront. So, just like Lagos, our waterfront neighbourhoods have traditionally been industrial with transportation access. So, what did we do? Part of our strategy then was to look for a way to move people to our shores and make sure that those neighbourhoods are connected to the rest of the city.

So, in a nutshell, we turned our waterways into a ferry superhighway and New York Ferry was born. This entirely new system was launched a couple of years ago, and with four ferry roads, for just \$2.75 dollars, passengers can travel from Brooklyn along the East River and up to The Bronx. So, talking about reinvention then, we have a lot of similarities between New York and Lagos. Of course, the devil is in the detail but given what we are seeing with the pandemic and how it has ravaged major urban centers, I think that ensuring that the unique capabilities that exist in Lagos would need to be harnessed in order to build a city that can cater to the economy, and the way to approach that is by looking at public partnerships.

Yemi Cardoso:

This has been a very good insight into the things that have made New York very unique, and one of the things that you spoke about is the issue of multiplicity of partnerships, because I noticed when you were talking about partnerships,

you were talking also of academia because sometimes, there's a tendency to just think it's public and private alone. There are so many other types of partnerships that go into making some of these things happen, and the extent of those partnerships really go as far as your imagination can take you.

Hon. Sam Egube:

Indeed. As I listen to you, what I see is that Lagos is organised along the path of partnerships and it's interesting — the point you made. In Lagos, we do not think that all the knowledge that is required to build the city rests in government alone.

So, you see the way we are organised, we have different kinds of trust funds, those are different kinds of partnerships. We have the Police Trust Fund, we have the Employment Trust Fund — which is where Teju sits, we have the Rebuild Lagos Trust Fund, and all of those are combinations of partnerships to just ensure that we are able to harness the capacity that our people have and channel it into the development of Lagos.

While we want to ensure that we develop infrastructure going forward and we are doing quite a lot in that aspect — we have over 291 billion, an increase of 33% from last year's infrastructure, but we recognise that human capacity development is very important. If you do not harness the capacity of your people, if you are unable to improve their productivity through the kind of training and exposure you give them, and the kind of partnerships you are able to harness around then, then your infrastructure will not produce any outcome.

When we look at human capital development, we always throw health in the mix, because if you have a lot of educated people but they are unhealthy, the productivity of the people will not come out. So, we've done quite a lot this time and we've tried to harness together everything we are doing around human capital development. In other words, with women and poverty alleviation, with wealth creation and employment, even with the Education Ministry itself, and the Employment Trust Fund. We are bringing every effort into one point, and we've grown that to about another 33% to 40%. In fact, the vote for women and poverty alleviation went up by about 90%. Basically, we need to begin to strengthen our women, we need to begin to strengthen the environment to ensure that poverty begins its reduction pathway. So, that's one thing.

The other is that we are also trying to connect together with development agencies everywhere. So, we are delivering as one per se, in terms of, we have a granting committee, the structure that has been approved by a cabinet that ensures that all donations, all grants and all loans from

developmental agencies are coordinated and harnessed from a coordinated platform, so that we do not have multiplicity of effort. Those contributions are not just monetary, they are technical contributions.

Just this morning, I started off conversation with academia also to join the economic planning protocol, and I think Ehingbeti is that one big platform, The Lagos Economic Summit that actually connects all our partners together with a conversation, and that's a very big event that contributes to Lagos on a constant basis. In the past eight Ehingbetis, we've had 203 resolutions and we've implemented about 193 of them. So, it's a very veritable tool to drive development.

The uniqueness of this 20th anniversary Ehingbeti is that we are also flagging off a thirty-year development plan at the same time. So, the input from this Ehingbeti dialogue will then flow into our planning mechanisms and this particular plan is going to be full of several initiatives that the public of Lagos will own and therefore create an ecosystem of accountability and transparency, both for our government and for future governments to commit to this executing plan.

Yemi Cardoso:

Talking about partnerships, I tend to wonder sometimes how the issue of trust is established. Because at the end of the day, why should I trust the next man, or why should somebody in the private sector trust the people in the public sector, and on the other hand, why should the public sector trust the people in academia? That whole issue of trust is something that continues to hang over everyone in terms of how they bridge that gap. And I think two things are relevant. One, and particularly in respect to the rebuilding effort, is when you have disparate groups.

I think it's useful to have an interlocutor so that if I do not agree with you from the private sector, there's somebody you trust who can come in and bridge that gap between you. Secondly, and I think this is key particularly in the case of Lagos and as the rebuilding effort commences, integrity, openness, and accountability. If you cannot do those things, don't waste your time talking about rebuilding anything. This is my view.

People want to come forward and say, "How do we all come together to fix these things?" There must be a mechanism that builds that trust with them to ensure that any single penny that is spent is accounted for.

Teju Abisoye:

How do we build trust with government institutions? So, what we have done following the pandemic and also the protests that happened in Lagos, the vandalisation and looting that happened in Lagos State, was to establish a fund which is around how to help small businesses recover immediately, so we don't lose jobs.

The money wasn't just coming from the government. It was a partnership with the private sector, development partners, even other non-governmental agencies in that bucket. We set up a steering committee of the donors, so everybody agreed with the framework around how to verify and how to distribute the funds we were going to give out to the businesses. It helped to improve accountability and, like you said, transparency. We publish and provide updates on what we are doing with regards to that fund for recovery. But more importantly, if we rebuild, we need to put in elements that'll make sure we don't have a repeat of the distribution.

When we look at it, what the underlying challenges are is economic and people are not satisfied. Do they have enough economic opportunities? Are they able to express themselves or achieve their aspirations? And LSETF is here to make sure that we are bridging that gap. Even the underserved communities as well, how do we make sure they get the right skills and access to the right opportunities, both in government, in partnership with private sector and commercial banks? How do we make sure we are able to bridge that gap? It's by providing the right skills, first of all. Access to affordable capital, so you don't need collateral to be able to get that access. How do you access infrastructure? So, you don't necessarily have to have your own office, but we can have mixed use facilities that you can get a space in at no cost. So, you are building your aspirations, you are building your dreams, and more recently, we are looking for more businesses for people with low skills, because the gap is quite wide.

You look at the demography in Lagos for example, 60% are just school leavers. So, when the Commissioner talks about vocational training, education, we have to be very strategic with how we provide education. It's just not the formal education, but when people do have just secondary school leaving certificates, how do we get their skills to be able to achieve their own economic objectives? Those are the kind of structure we are working with and we are big on partnerships. So, at LSETF, it's a partnership at this level or the other. Sometimes, it's the commercial banks, sometimes it's the development agencies, or academia, which we actually sit on an advisory board, UNILAG to be specific, as well as getting opportunities to young people. So, it's just so critical and we agree with you that partnership diversification is necessary to make sure that in this rebuilding effort, it's sustainable, well structured, and will last.

Yemi Cardoso:

Frankly, without funding available, without the buying of the different sectors and different stakeholders, then this would just be a nice conversation to have.

Prof. Fred Olayele:

I think Lagos has got to be strategic in economic development. You have to be able to craft a strategy that brings your unique capabilities to the core. Lagos is a dense urban center. What does that mean? You've got to be able to leverage one of the assets, bring the private sectors, leverage the state's resources to bring more than proportionate returns to what you are looking for, what some people would call impact investing. This is about leveraging private capital to produce social good. And finally, traditional for the tech ecosystem, folks often look at Silicon Valley. I don't know if you saw the World Economic Forum report that came out two years ago, and that report says New York is the second jurisdiction globally for the tech ecosystem, and they are not just looking at those true traditional metrics like venture capital or patent or investment dollars. One of the reasons was the human capital, because as the center of diversity, when you have talents from all over the world, that's a major indicator of what the future looks like. And the more I think about New York, the more I think about Lagos, there are just so many similarities that can be harnessed to build a win-win strategy.

Yemi Cardoso:

Thank you very much, Fred. I must tell you that Fred said that there's nothing else that would allow him to be away from his family on a Saturday like this than coming to talk about Lagos and the issues that we've just been talking about here, and I'm very pleased because I can see the passion with which you are talking about it and I'm very happy that you are prepared to engage with us going forward.

Because there's no doubt about the fact that in this business, nobody has a monopoly on wisdom, and we have so much to learn because we are entering a space that hitherto is not one that we are very used to, especially since it's going to be the inevitability of having a partnership to do this. So, we are going to do it in a way that is completely different from the way it had been done before, and that's why the Rebuild Lagos effort is a partnership really.

It's not a government effort, neither is it a private sector effort, although in this particular case, there's predominance of the private sector, but it is a PPP between the two to see how forces can be joined together to ensure that we are able to positively impact the greater good.
